

Hear Sharkey-Carnera Fight Returns Over Tribune Loudspeaker

PICKING FAVORITE IS TOUGH JOB FOR FIGHT FOLLOWERS

Crowd of 60,000 Expected to Cram Madison Square Bowl for Heavyweight Championship Go Tonight

NEW YORK, June 29.—(AP)—Jack Sharkey, the temperamental ex-sailor from Boston, will defend his heavyweight championship of the world against Italy's "man mountain," Primo Carnera, in a 15-round bout at Madison Square Garden's big battle bowl on Long Island tonight.

Under the stimulus of hot weather and the impetus given the fight by the successful Max Baer-Max Schmeling scrap three weeks ago, a crowd of some 60,000 is expected to cram the bowl and pour more than \$250,000 into the coffers of the Garden and of the milk fund, which shares in the receipts.

Many Angles in Dope
This disparity in the size of the contestants; Carnera's undoubtedly great improvement since the Boston gob handed him an artistic lacing at Ebbets field two years ago; Sharkey's temperament, which has betrayed him into costly mistakes in previous bouts, gave the meeting a flock of "angles" which still had the faithful jittering around in search of a favorite today.

Sharkey started out with an edge in the betting, but the confidence of Carnera's backers pounded the odds down until the fans were faced with the unusual situation of having a champion rated at no better than even money against the challenger.

Biggest Ringster
Carnera, the biggest man ever to fight for the world's title, was expected to tip the scales at 369, just 65 pounds more than the champion, at the official weighing-in at the offices of the New York State athletic commission at 1 p. m. (E. S. T.) today.

Gob in Good Form
Sharkey, in perfect condition, has displayed everything he needs to defend the crown in his workouts, speed, snap, confidence and a venomous punching power that has worked havoc among his sparring partners.

The Bostonian's age, 31 years, also seems to have weighed against him in the minds of the faithful although the ring's records show a dozen or more heavyweights who had just reached their fighting prime at that age.

VINES DEFEATS AGILE JAPANESE IN NET TOURNAMENT

WIMBLEDON, Eng., June 29.—(AP)—Ellsworth Vines, apparently recovered from an ankle injury suffered Tuesday, today defeated the agile little Japanese star, R. Miki, 6-2, 6-4, 6-4 in the third round of the Wimbledon tennis championships to continue successful defense of his title.

Helen Jacobs, United States women's tennis champion, started the day off right for the Americans by defeating N. Trentham, ninth ranking English player, 6-2, 6-1.

Mrs. Dorothy Andrus Burke, of Stamford, Conn., kept the American representation intact as she defeated Mrs. L. R. C. Mitchell, one of England's better players, in a three-set struggle, 3-6, 6-3, 6-2.

Mrs. Helen Willis Moody, defending her women's singles title, kept pace with her fellow Californian, as she defeated England's ranking player, little Mary Healy, 6-1, 6-1.

Cliff Butter, third ranking United States player, scored a rather surprising straight set victory over Baron Gottfried von Gramm, handsome German Davis cup star and his country's leading player since the athletic banishment of Daniel Penn, 6-3, 6-4, 6-7, in the third round.

Walter Podolak, 208, Syracuse, N. Y., won the semi-windup from Geo. Koverly, 212, Hollywood, taking one fall in the fourth of five rounds.

Chat Wiles, 176, Portland, defeated Larry Bennett, 176, Portland, with one fall in the preliminary.

EGAN FACES YOUTH IN QUARTER FINAL OF GOLF TOURNEY

Medford Star Will Play Alan Taylor Today in P. N. A.—Dr. Willing Will Also Meet Youthful Opponent

VICTORIA, B. C., June 29.—(AP)—Two tested veterans of Pacific Northwest amateur golf, H. Chandler (Chan) Egan, defending titlist, of Medford, Ore., and Dr. O. P. Willing of Portland, battled youth today over the links of the Oak Bay course in the annual northwest tournament.

With the field down to eight in the quarter final round, Egan, seeking his sixth title, ran up against the acclimating game of Alan Taylor, son of Phil Taylor, the Victoria Golf club pro, while Dr. Willing met Ken Black, of Vancouver, the youthful holder of both the provincial amateur and open titles.

The draw: Albert (Scotty) Campbell, Seattle, vs. Johnny Shields, Seattle; Lee Stell, Seattle, vs. Paul Murphy, Seattle; Egan vs. Taylor.

Black vs. Willing.
No such easy struggle as Egan ran up against yesterday in winning an overwhelming 16 to 14 victory over Des Barrett, Victoria, faced him today, if Taylor was in top form.

Down yesterday five holes at the end of the first 18 against Dr. Cliff Baker of Kalama, Ore., Taylor began sensational shooting, pulling even with Baker at the 29th, and finally winning two up, with a birdie four on the 36th, when Baker just missed a 30-foot putt.

In the top bracket, with four Seattle players all comparative youngsters, except Stell, left, the Puget Sound city was assured a man in the finals on Saturday for the first time in 10 years, when Stell was runner-up to Egan, at the Seattle Golf club.

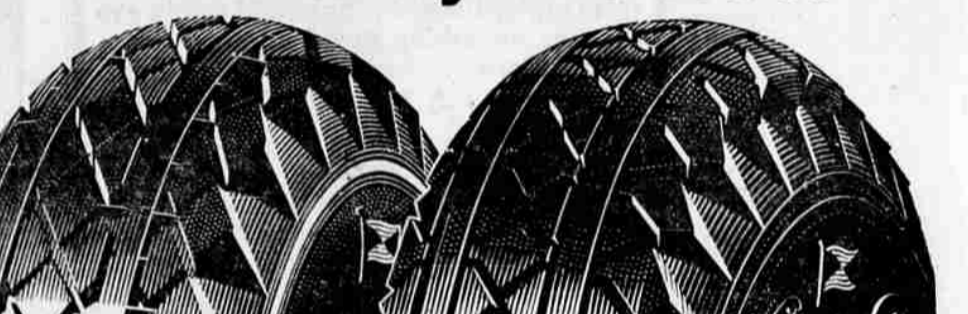
