

FIRE PERMITS ARE REQUIRED FOR U.S. FOREST LAND CAMP

Announcement was made today by the office of the Rogue River National Forest, that during the period between July 1 and September 30, it is necessary to obtain a permit from a forest officer to build a camp fire on federal forest land, except in a safe stove or at a designated forest camp where camp fire permits are not required.

The act also makes it unlawful to smoke while traveling in timber, brush or grass areas except on a road or surfaced highway. It is necessary for motorists and travelers in any kind of vehicle to have an axe, a shovel and a water container, to be used in fighting fire if necessary.

Diagrams are being placed in the chamber of commerce and about the city showing the necessary equipment, required by law.

Camps in the Rogue River National Forest where camp fire permits are not required:

Rogue River District: Woodruff Meadows Bridge, Woodruff Meadows, Natural Bridge, Union Creek, Farewell Bend, Castle Creek, Bybee Creek, Brown's Cabin Bridge, row's Cabin, Crater Creek, Foster Bridge, Rogue River, National Creek, Hurryon, Hamaker O. S. Camp, Hamaker Creek, Minnehaha, Mazama, Rogue River, Silver Camp, Warpeg, Whiskey, Huckleberry, Wagon, and Copeland.

Butte Falls District: South Fork Butte Creek, North Fork Butte Creek, Dead Indian District: Dead Indian Soda Springs, Lake o the Woods, 3 camps.

Klamath District: Malona Springs, Recreation, Crystal Springs, Seven Mile, Wild Cat, Odesa.

Applegate District: Middlefork Applegate Bridge, Bridge.

These camps will be posted with "Camp Fire Permits Not Required on this Forest Camp" signs, the forest service announced.

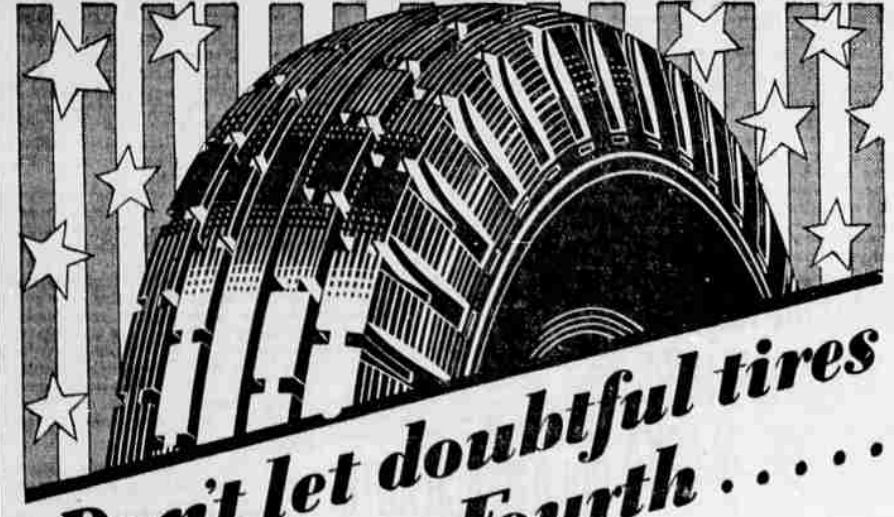
30 CENT PROCESS TAX WILL NOT BE CHANGED
