EGAN DEFEATED BY YOUTH WHEN PUTTING SOURS

19-Year-Old Victorian Wins 3 and 1 From Medford Ace—Dr. Willing Comes Through to Semi-Final

VICTORIA, B. C., June 30.—(AP)—Youth and experience battle it out today when a pair of smooth-working youngsters tackle two seasoned veterans to determine who shall be finalist in the annual northwest amateur golf tournament.

Alan Taylor, son of Phil Taylor, Victoria Golf club pro, encountered Dr. O. F. Willing, Portland, former United States Walker cup star, in one of the 36-hole semi-final matches, with young Albert (Scotty) Campbell, Seattle city champion and runner-up

last year in the national public links tournament, meeting Lee Stell, also of Seattle, in the other.

"Chan" Lowe, 3 and 1.
The 19-year-old Victorian kicked the bottom out of the dope bucket yesterday when he eased himself into the final four with a sensational 3 and 1 victory over H. Chandise (Chan) Egan of Medford, Ore., defending titlist and five times winner of the championship.

Egan, his putting touch deserting him from the start, couldn't match Taylor's steady shooting, and they went to lunch at the end of the first 18 holes with the youngster 6-up, turning in a card of 70, one over par. Egan put on a gallant battle in the afternoon and regained three holes, but finally went down when Taylor steadied near the end.

Willing wins 5 and 4.
Dr. Willing won his semi-finalist berth with a 5 and 4 victory over Ken Black, Vancouver holder of both provincial amateur and open crowns. The Portland shot-maker's dazzling approximate 64 in the morning round gave him a 5-hole advantage over the Canadian at lunch-time, and he held that lead at the finish.

In the women's play, the defending champion, Mrs. Vera Hutchings of Vancouver clinched herself a spot in the semi-final round with a 4 and 3 victory over Mrs. B. E. Eva, Portland. She was joined by a pair of Portlanders, Mrs. G. J. Jones and Miss

Marion McDougall, and Mrs. W. A. Kirkman of Seattle.

SHARKEY NERVOUS TIRED AFTER BOUT

NEWTON, Mass., June 30.—(AP)—Jack Sharkey, who lost his heavyweight boxing championship to Primo Carnera in New York last night, arrived at his suburban Boston home today, tired, nervous and visibly upset after driving from New York.

Much of the perturbation and nervousness appeared to be due to the condition of his wife, who he said probably would go to a hospital today or tomorrow for an operation. "Trouble," he said, "always comes in bunches."

Sharkey seemed unmarked by the bout except for a slight discoloration of his right eye, but said he was tired, having had no sleep since Thursday night.
