HUSBAND SLAYS SLEEPING MATE



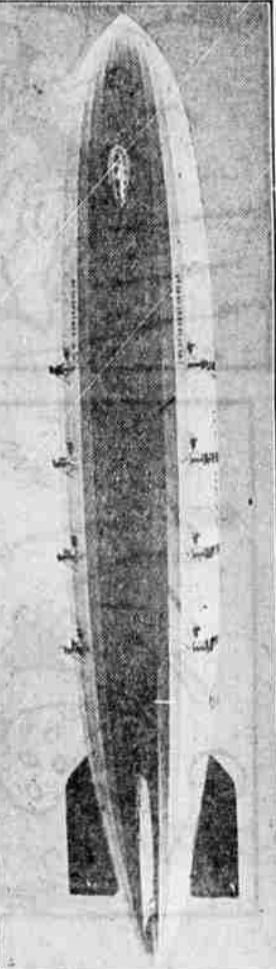

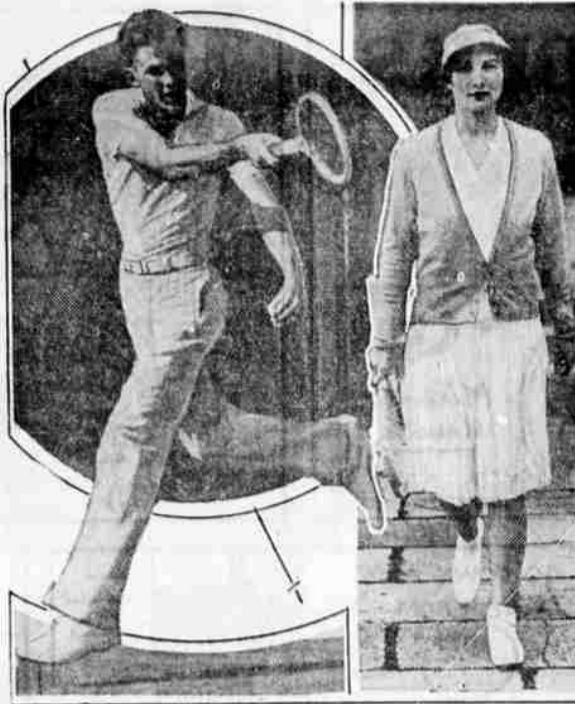
This unusual picture of the Macon, the navy's new dirigible, was made as the giant ship passed directly overhead on one of its test flights. (Associated Press Photo)

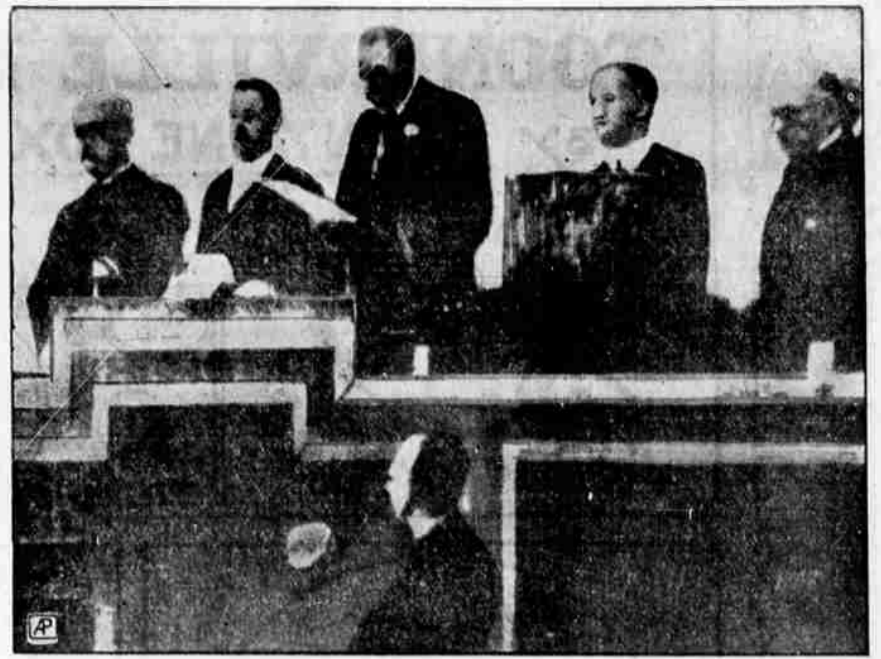

ARIZONA TRACK STARS ENTER MEET



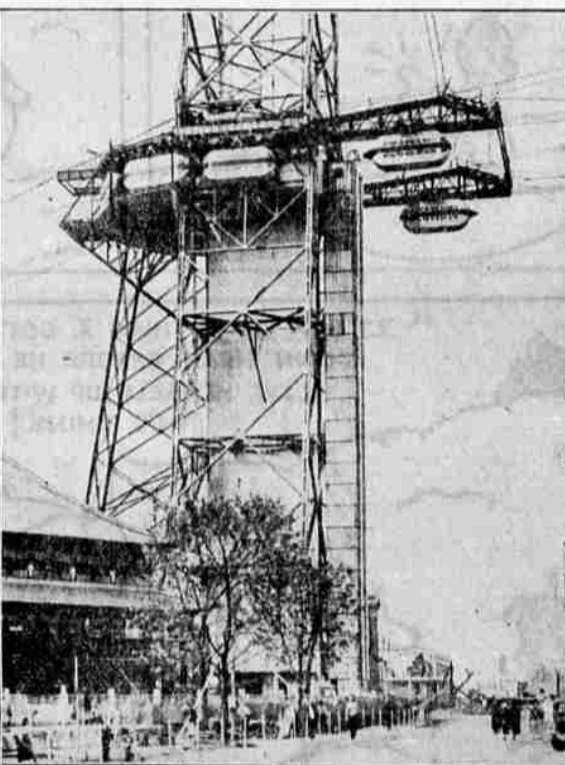
