INTANGIBLE INCOME TAX LAW IS UPHELD

SALEM, July 5—(AP)—The constitutionality of the 1931 intangible income tax law was upheld by the Oregon supreme court today in an opinion handed down in the case of Ruth C. McPherson against the state tax commission.

The plaintiff, in the suit, challenged the right of the state legislature to impose a tax on her intangibles income without exemption "simply be-

cause she had a thrifty husband who has an income of more than \$2500 per year, and grant an unmarried woman with the same income from the same source, an exemption."
