

GROWERS WARNED SPIDER MITES IN PEAR TREES NOW

Spider mites have made their appearance in pear trees during the past few days and general leaf injury has occurred in several different orchards. Growers are advised by L. P. Wilcox, county agent and L. G. Gentner of the So. Oregon Experiment Station to be on the watch from now on and apply control measures when their pear trees first show signs of leaf damage.

Because of the spray residue problem, growers are requested to consult their county agent as to the best program to use in case infestations appear in late July and August.

The mites, commonly called red spiders may be classed as a major pest to fruit trees and growers should be able to recognize the symptoms of infestation and be prepared to apply control measures immediately.

The mites work on the under sides of the leaves, causing such leaves to turn brown and black and later to fall off. Such a defoliation is harmful, not only to the fruit now present but also to the formation of fruit buds representing next season's crop. To prevent such damage and yet not complicate the fruit cleaning process, growers should apply control measures if signs of injured leaves are noticed within the next ten days. The D'Anjou and Bosc varieties will probably show damage first, so watch these trees close.

Recommended control is as follows: On pears use medium summer oil emulsion at the rate of 1 1/2 gallons to the 100 gallons of water. D'Anjou, Bosc and Comice varieties probably are the only ones that need receive this treatment. Bartlett should not be sprayed with oil emulsion at this time, if they are to be cleaned and packed for eastern shipment.

On apples use 1 1/2 gallons of light summer oil emulsion to the 100 gallons of water. Successful control depends a great deal on the application, spray thoroughly the under-sides of all leaves, especially those in toward the center of the tree.

3-C MEMBERS IN VETS' HOSPITAL

Charles L. Jarrett and Raymond Conover of Camp Bly, of the Civilian Conservation Corps, were yesterday taken to the soldiers' hospital at Roseburg, and Staff Sergeant Oliver of the U. S. Army, stationed at Camp Reuben, was sent to Camp Appleton.

Jarrett suffered an attack of acute appendicitis, and Conover was treated for a broken leg, acquired while attending a baseball game in Bly. A grandstand, in which there were several hundred spectators crashed, and Conover was injured.

Sergeant Oliver was treated for a broken shoulder, and was placed in Appleton camp. Major James R. Bingham, Medford district CCC surgeon, accompanied the two youths to Roseburg.

EXTRA PAY GIVEN SOME IN FORESTS

For CCC workers who exhibit qualities of initiative, industry and leadership, new regulations for the workers provide that "no more than 5 per cent of the authorized strength of any CCC company may be paid a cash allowance of \$45 per month, while an additional 5 per cent may be paid a cash allowance of \$35 per month." Previous regulations provided for a flat cash allowance of \$30 for each enrolled man.

Those to receive the increase in pay, according to instructions issued by Major General Malin Craig, are to be selected by the company commander and the camp superintendent for each camp. Men selected for the increase in pay will assist in the administration of camps and in many cases in overseeing work to be performed in the forests.

ALL-STATE PICNIC TO HONOR GENL. MARTIN

Attorney Frank DeSouza, yesterday announced that an all-state picnic honoring General Charles H. Martin, congressman from the third district, will be held on the Columbia river July 16. DeSouza received the information from J. T. Summerville, secretary of the Democratic state central committee.

The state picnic will be the first of its kind to be held by the Democratic party in Oregon. DeSouza said, and he also expressed the hope that a few Democrats from southern Oregon would attend.

DeSouza will have tickets for the picnic in case any wish to go.

Hitler Consolidates Work Program

00 Employment Projects Blanket Law Covers \$250,000,0

BERLIN—(AP)—Plans for relieving the unemployment situation advanced by previous governments have been rolled into one gigantic measure by the Hitler cabinet in an effort to pull Germany out of the rut.



Throughout the plan which calculates to spend a billion marks, or \$250,000,000, and put 1,250,000 men back to work in fields, factories and offices, one may observe Brüning, von Papen and von Schleicher, all of whom busied themselves with the same problem.

Unemployment Cut Claimed
Broadly speaking the plan is based on two theses, lightening of the debt and tax burdens through various means, and stimulation of business by means of treasury loans to groups, individuals and municipalities.

The Hitler administration claims that thus far it has brought down the number of unemployed to 5,000,000, roughly a million less than the high point this winter and some 50,000 less than the low of last year. The 1,000,000,000 marks will be amortized through budget levies over the next five years.

Replacements Reduce Taxes
Tax exemptions will be allowed for various machinery replacements in factories, as long as the purchases are made within Germany.

Funds will be put at the disposal of water and electricity works for extension of their services and to municipalities and districts which will use the money for improvement of canals, subways and public buildings. These latter loans will be interest free, but other loans will bear a nominal rate.

Fritz Reinhardt, state secretary in the ministry of finance, estimates that the plan will absorb 1,250,000 persons from the floating supply of unemployed workers. He indicated that additional laws would be promulgated by the cabinet from time to time as conditions warrant.

Embraced in the blanket law are proposals whereby tax evaders, until October 1 of this year, may avoid the risk of jail sentences and fines.

A tax evader whose conscience bothers him may go to his lawyer and pay the amount of the evasion. Thereupon the lawyer sends it in his own name to the finance department and receives a receipt. This receipt is a guarantee against future prosecution.

The government said this would be the last amnesty for tax dodgers.

Private funds established to alleviate the lot of the unemployed may be deducted in their entirety from the gross income in figuring income taxes the new law provides.

SPEEDIER TICKER SERVICE NEEDED

NEW YORK, July 6.—(AP)—Clamor for a speedier New York stock exchange ticker has risen to a shrill pitch since the advent of the inflation bull market.

The present ticker, installed in September, 1930, is considerably faster than the instrument it displaced, but is nevertheless inadequate for the prompt reporting of transactions in five and six million share days, according to its critics.

The ticker system operates at a printing speed of 600 characters per minute.

TOM KAY ESTATE GOING TO WIDOW AND 2 CHILDREN

SALEM, July 6.—(AP)—Personal property appraised at \$121,951 will be turned over to the three heirs of the late Thomas B. Kay, state treasurer, according to the final report of the estate filed yesterday in probate court here by Cora M. Kay, administratrix of the estate.

Real property valued at \$5900 was also left by the state treasurer while his estimate holdings in entirety with the widow in real property ran between \$50,000 and \$100,000.

The estate was admitted to probate in May, 1931, and the value of all personal and real property is of that date. Under the Oregon law the widow receives one-half of the personal property, while Errol Kay and Marjorie Kay Huntington, the two children, each receive one-quarter. The widow receives a dower right to one-half of the personal property.

BURNS BONDS BRING SMALL SUM IN SALE

SALEM, July 6.—(AP)—Sale of four \$1000 sewer and water system bonds of the city of Burns for \$300 each was authorized yesterday in circuit court here for the depositors of the Aurora State Bank, insolvent.

A. A. Schramm, state bank superintendent, asserted that 30 cents on the dollar was the highest bid available. The book value to the bank for the bonds was \$3920; the receipts from the sale were \$1200 and interest.
