

Babe Ruth Is Hero of American League All Stars 4 to 2 Victory

HOMER IN THIRD PROVIDES MARGIN TO WIN CLASSIC

Gehring On Base When Mighty Wallop Comes in Game Staged to Settle Ancient Fan Controversy

COMISKEY PARK, Chicago, July 6.—(AP)—Babe Ruth blazed out as the star of stars once more today to smash out a home run in the third inning to give the American league all-stars their winning margin in a great 4-2 victory over the hand-picked team of the National league before 49,000 spectators.

As the great panorama of stars fell and shone, Ruth drove out his long distance wallop with Charley Gehring of Detroit on base to push his mates ahead to stay as General Alvin Crowder and Lefty Grove, relief pitchers for Vernon Gomez, kept the National batters in check except for a home run by Frankie Frisch of the St. Louis Cardinals and Lonnie Warnecke, pitching star of the Chicago Cubs, who pitched well, hit a triple and scored on an infield out.

These National league moundmen saw action, Bill Hallahan of St. Louis, the starter; Bill Warneke and Carl Hubbell who yielded nine, hits; Gomez Crowder and Grove pitching for the Americans, surrendering eight blows.

CAN KARASICK CUT STRING OF KRUSE MAT VICTORIES?

Fans of the Rogue River valley who like their wrestling evenly matched and with plenty of roughness and aggressiveness on both sides, will do well to attend the match at the armory tonight between Al Karasick, old bulldog of the ring, and Bob Kruse, the bad boy from Oswego. These two gladiators meet on Mack Lillard's wrestling card for the main event of the evening.

Kruse is well remembered here as the grappler who introduced rough-house methods to armory affairs of the mat. Kruse built up an enviable reputation for a wrestler—he had every fan in the valley hoping someone would crown him with a stove poker—but somehow it never happened. Karasick may be the boy to do just that sort of trick, fans think, and a crowded house is expected tonight.

Kruse and Karasick will wrestle the main event, a best two-falls-out-of-three affair, while George Koverly of Hollywood, 200 pounds, and Scotty Dawkins, 202, of somewhere south of the Mason-Dixon line, will open the card with a 45-minute match, or best two out of three. Lillard says the boys are both rough and fast, and he doesn't expect the match to go a full 45 minutes, as too much can happen in that time.

The first match will start at 9 o'clock. Lillard announces, the time having been set back to allow the armory to cool off and the fans to get in from their evening golf.

HAGEN SETS HOT GOLFING PACE IN BRITISH TOURNEY

American Veteran Cards 72 On Second Round for Total of 140—Dudley Close Behind With 141

ST. ANDREWS, Scotland, July 6.—(AP)—Walter Hagen, the American veteran and four times holder of the title, kept a one-stroke lead in the British open golf championship today by shooting a 72, one under par, for his second round and a total of 140 for 36 holes.

A rival American, Ed Dudley of Concordville, Pa., was on his heels with 70-71-141. Gene Sarazen of New York, the defending champion, tossed away a great chance to overhaul the pace setters by taking 40 strokes for the last nine holes, scoring 73 for his second round and a total of 145, five shots back of Hagen. A six on the short 11th was disastrous for the champion. Sarazen went into a tie with Leo Diegel, who had 75-70-145 and Joe Kirkwood, with 72-73-145. Duplicating Hagen's great first round, Abe Mitchell, the veteran British professional, gave the gallery a thrill with a 68, five under par, and hurled into third place, two strokes behind Hagen and one stroke back of Dudley with a total of 142. Mitchell had a 74 yesterday.

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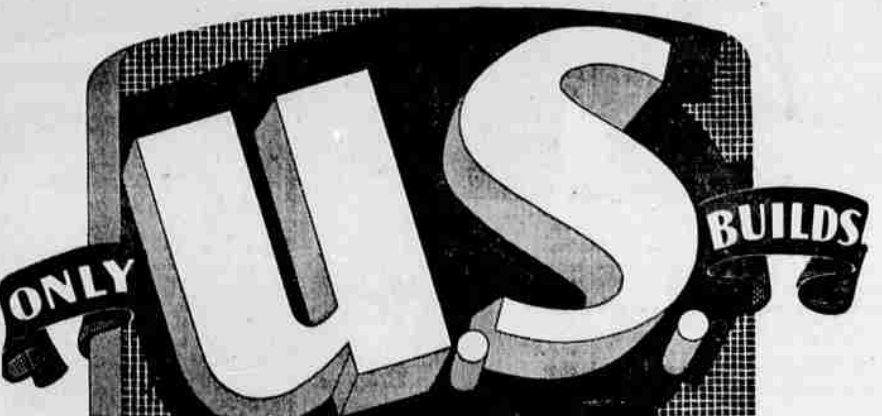
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
