AUSTRALIAN AGE DEFEATS VINES FOR NET TITLE

WIMBLEDON, England, July 7.—(AP)—Jack Crawford, Australian star, won the final round of the men's singles and with it the Wimbledon championship from Ellsworth Vines today, 4-6, 11-4, 6-2, 2-6, 6-4.

The Australian became, temporarily at least, king of the tennis world as he added the prized Wimbledon title to that of his native land and of France. He bitter five set victory over Vines, who won the title last year, follows by only a few weeks a straight set victory over Henri Cochet, once great sco of France, in the finals of the French championships.

It was the eighth meeting between the new and the old titleholders of Wimbledon with Crawford victor now in three matches to five for the American champion.

Vines easily took the first set 6-4 but Crawford then came back to run off the next two, the third rather easily. When the American came flashing back with all his old speed to win 6-2 and even the match it seemed as though he had the championship again at his mercy, but Crawford, a real stylist of the courts and almost as big as Vines, was not to be denied and smashed through to victory to gain rightful ranking as the leading player of the world.

SWIMMING COURSE SAVES GIRL'S LIFE

VANCOUVER, Wash., July 7.—(AP)—The training George Demos, 11, received in the public school swimming courses in Salem stood him in good stead here Thursday, and he was acclaimed as a hero today for the rescue of Betty Jean Cline, 9, from the swirling waters of the Columbia river.

Betty had fallen from a floating runway at a Vancouver dock. George, a slender lad of 53 pounds, heard her cries. A whirlpool had caught the girl and was spinning her dizzily. The first impulse George had was to dive into the stream. He remembered, then, the training he had had in the Salem schools. The first precept of lifesaving is to "row, throw or go."

"I just hung onto the slippery logs," he said, "and waited until the whirlpool swept her around to me. She'd gone down again but when she came up I grabbed her and slipped part of the way into the water until I could get a good hold. Then I climbed up and pulled her up."
