

SALES TAX WILL AID SCHOOL FUND JACKSON COUNTY

Salvation of School Systems Seen in Proposed Law—Present Situation Due to Non-Payment Land Taxes

The sales tax to be voted on in this month's election will, if approved by the people, bring into the school channels of Jackson county in the year 1934 the distribution of \$38,076.08 to the common school fund and \$36,548.22 to school districts. A total of \$74,624.30, according to figures released by Charles V. Galloway, chairman of the state tax commission. Such a sum would prove the salvation of school systems, now facing a deplorable situation through the non-payment of taxes, educators in receipt of the figures pointed out here today.

Based on equalization of 1932 taxable valuations, Jackson county would receive \$29,936 of sales tax revenues apportioned to counties; therefore an estimated apportionment of \$3,000,000 of such revenues to counties in 1934. Jackson county would receive approximately \$48,068. The distribution of this amount to the common school fund and to groups of tax levying municipalities of the county, based on 1932 general property taxes levied, would bring the figures listed and to miscellaneous taxing districts \$775. Actual apportionment will be based on levies to appear on the 1933 tax roll. The amounts and percentages listed are therefore approximations, based on latest available levies appearing on the 1932 roll. They are as follows:

PENILESS ORPHAN WILL TAKE PLACE OF RICH MAN'S SON

OMAHA, Neb., July 7.—(UP)—Peter Christophola, 13 years old, was a penniless inmate of an orphan's home today. But tomorrow he will leave for New Jersey to become the adopted son of a Paterson millionaire.

The change from orphanage to millionaire's home was the result of a strange coincidence.

Peter, orphaned shortly after birth, has never been away from the immediate vicinity of Omaha. He has never ridden on a railroad train.

But he is soprano soloist with the band and glee club at Father Flanagan's home, and a picture of the band and glee club was printed in a newspaper in Paterson.

One of the readers of the paper was the millionaire, whose 16-year-old son was drowned 18 months ago endeavoring to save the life of a companion.

The millionaire saw the picture and noticed a striking resemblance between his son and Peter Christophola. He communicated with the home and adopted Peter.

"I hope I don't wake up and find it's nothing but a dream," the excited happy orphan said today.

LOS ANGELES, July 7.—(UP)—Oliver Hardy, film comic, made his gambling conform with his weighty, round figure, Mrs. Myrtle Hardy charged today in a cross complaint for divorce.

Hardy, no piker, crossed \$30,000 on an Agua Caliente horse race and followed this with a \$3000 turn at

the roulette wheel, his wife averred.

The comedian filed a divorce suit last week, alleging Mrs. Hardy drank to excess. This charge she denied in her cross suit today.

It was the second action brought against Hardy since he decided to seek a divorce. His wife's sister, Mrs. Mary P. Hunter, asked \$50,000 damages she claimed were suffered when Hardy beat and kicked her last June 29.

Mrs. Hardy's suit alleged the fight started when the actor falsely accused her of "trying to check up on his conduct with a blonde," and then slapped her sister and his chauffeur. Then, she said, he armed himself with two shotguns and remained up all night.

Mrs. Hardy claimed her husband earns \$8000 a month and that their community property is worth \$100,000. She asked \$1400 a month alimony and a \$4000 attorney's fee.

Hardy's film partner, Stan Laurel, was sued for divorce by Mrs. Lois Laurel five weeks ago.
