POLITICAL HANDS SHOULD BE KEPT OFF OF SCHOOLS

National Education Association May Voice Protest On Growing Interference—Sex Equality Is Aim

CHICAGO, July 7.—(Sp.)—Resolutions condemning cities which have "failed unnecessarily to pay their teachers" and urging school boards to refrain from firing school boards in costs of salaries, were before teachers of the national education association for approval today.

"The association vigorously protests against the policy of cities which have unnecessarily failed to pay their teachers and which, in meeting public obligations, have discriminated against teachers," the resolution on salaries said.

"In view of rising costs," said the resolution on school expenditures, "school boards should refrain from further cutting school costs, including salaries." It also urges that "valuable services and courses which have been eliminated" be restored.

Declaring that school management must be non-political, one resolution condemns what it calls "the growing political interference in the appointment of school officials and teachers."

Other stands taken by the resolutions committees were:

"Teachers of equivalent training and experience doing the same kind of work should receive equal pay, regardless of sex."

"Teachers should not be discriminated against because of married status."

"There must be mitigation of excessive real estate taxation and a sharing of the burden by equitable taxes from other sources. The solvency of the schools is dependent upon the application of scientific principles of taxation."

Instruction—"complete and specific"—on the effects of alcohol and narcotics is urged in another resolution.

Nels Olson is the lookout on Bald Mountain this season. Dwight Phipps took him up July 1.



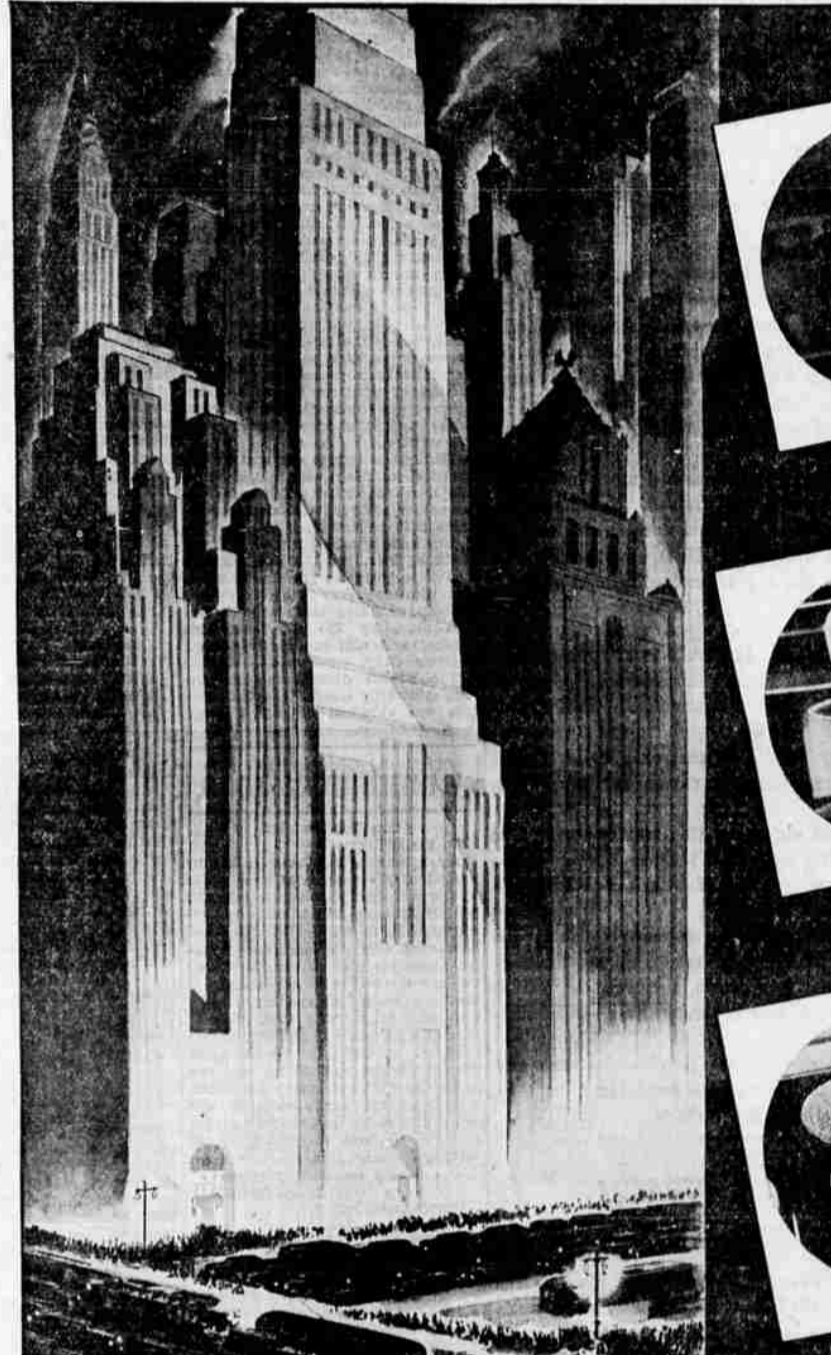
