Activities of Legion Auxiliary

Mrs. William Lee Bricker, chairman of Fidac for the auxiliary of Medford post, has given the question of Fidac quite an extensive study. "What is Fidac?" This question is asked members of the American Legion Auxiliary more frequently than almost any other question dealing with auxiliary work.

Every time the strange sounding word comes up in conversation relating to the auxiliary when persons not familiar with the organization are present, someone is sure to ask the above question. Fidac is the convenient abbreviation of Federation Interallies des Anciens Combattants, and it is the organization of the veterans' societies of the allied countries of the World war.

Fidac has also a woman's auxiliary, composed of over 50 women's organizations that are associated with the World war veterans organizations in the allied countries. One million women are included in Fidac Auxiliary.

Fidac was founded in Paris on November 28, 1920. The national commander of the American Legion had an active part in the formation. All American Legion members are automatically members of Fidac; their dues are paid by the national Legion organization. Fidac headquarters are at 15 Rue de Presles, Paris, France.

The principal object of Fidac is to maintain, foster and develop that spirit of comradeship which manifested itself on the battlefield of the World war and use that comradeship in the cause of peace. Being non-political and non-sectarian, it can help all governments in any way that lays within its power. To see that in so far as possible justice is meted out to war disabled, to help the widows and orphans, to help in the maintenance of law and order, are some of the aims and purposes of this organization.

Fidac has definitely contributed toward world peace and consistently striven to remove friction between allied nations. It has assisted greatly in calming the French public opinion during the Franco-American debt discussions of 1929. It holds its annual congress in each allied country, in turn bringing before the world that the veterans stand united in the cause of peace, adequate national defense, individual nationalism and mutual helpfulness. These meetings afford useful channel of communication for all ex-service men of allied countries on all matters pertaining to their welfare and has served thousands by assisting veterans through providing evidence, locating missing relatives, graves, etc.

Fidac maintains complete files of all pension laws, retirement pensions, special privileges, hospitalization and rehabilitation of ex-service men throughout the world. It operates a travel bureau and a press bureau; sponsors exchange scholarships between different countries; promotes Boy Scout movement, works against communism and such disturbing elements to world peace.

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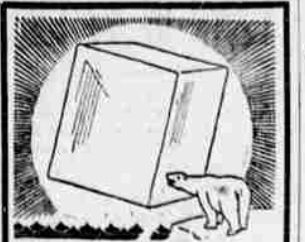
