LAKE IS FEATURED IN COSMOPOLITAN

Crater Lake, the magnet which each year draws more and more people from the east into far western Oregon, is this month featured in one of the most read magazines of the nation—"Cosmopolitan." In an article written by Mary Day Winn, reprinted in the largest illustration used in one of Crater Lake's small drawings of Chinatown in San Francisco, an Indian pueblo in Santa Fe, bus terminal and hotel in Kansas City, and the federal building at the Chicago fair, dot the upper section of the page, but Crater Lake has the largest reproduction of a photograph which appears as one of the scenic high-lights of the northwestern bus route, which the writer describes as "full of adventurous possibilities."

Dittmar of the New York zoo for her work, says: "Treatment is the secret of it. Snakes become as friendly as the average house dog."

RATTLESNAKE FAMILY BELIEVED FIRST BORN TO CAPTIVE PARENTS

MINNEAPOLIS, July 13.—(AP)—A slight, white-haired old lady of 82—"Mother Eleanor" to thousands of young people the world over—today was the center of all eyes at the biennial convention of the International Society of Christian Endeavor. She is Mrs. Harriet Abbott Clark, widow of Dr. Francis E. Clark, and with him co-founder of the first Endeavor society, which was organized in Portland, Me., in 1881. Despite her age, Mrs. Clark refused to miss the convention and traveled alone from her home in Boston to attend. "What the world needs today, more than the London conference or anything else," she said, "is religion and to live more the life of Christ. There is too much narrow nationalism." The convention adopted a resolution last night calling upon youth to fight repeal of the 18th amendment, and voted to hold its 1935 convention in Philadelphia. The Rev. Merton B. Rice, pastor of the Metropolitan Church of Detroit, told the convention last night he believes that the greatest and strongest work a church can do for its city is to preach straightforwardly and without compromise the whole gospel of Christ.
