PROBE OF WALKER COURT CONTEMPT NOW UNDER WAY

A thorough investigation into the case of Amos Walker, cited yesterday for contempt of court at the trial of Suspended Sheriff Gordon L. Schermerhorn, was being carried on today by the district attorney's office.

The matter was submitted to the district attorney by the court when Walker admitted on the witness stand that he had called at the home of George B. McClain, juror, to inquire "how he stood."

Walker stated that he had made the trip upon instructions of County Judge East H. Peil, also under indictment for the theft, and the court replied: "Someone is in contempt, I submit this question to the district attorney's office."

It was understood today that additional affidavits revealing Walker's conversations in the Phoenix community, where McClain resided, are being prepared.

McClain, following objections of the defense, voiced after the trial started, was discharged from the jury last Tuesday. Affidavits charging him with prejudice were presented by the defense.

Attorneys for the defendant yesterday stated they had no knowledge of Walker's trip to Phoenix after McClain had been chosen a juror. What action will be taken against him was not revealed.
