A great baseball day is in store for Medford fans Sunday. In addition to the regularly scheduled league game between the Rogues and Cheesemakers, the western Oregon American League championship will be decided when the Klamath Falls Junior Legion team meets Medford in the first game of the twin bill. The winner of the game will meet the winner of the coast counties tourney.

Rogues in Third Place
Although defeated last Sunday at Roseburg, Medford's Rogues are still in the running for the championship. With four games remaining on the league schedule, Medford is two games behind Coquille and one game out of second place. Fans expect a bitter battle between the Rogues and Cheesemakers as intense rivalry has marked every game the two teams have played all year.

Ashland at Coquille
Ashland's Lithians have a tough job on their hands when they engage the league-leading Loggers at the coast city. Due to poor turnouts at Ashland, the Lithians have decided to play their remaining games away from home. The Klamath Pelicans and Roseburg Vets will fight for undisputed hold on second place and a possible tie for first if Ashland is able to down Coquille.

BRITISH DOUBLES TEAM GAINS LEAD

WIMBLEDON, Eng., July 14.—(AP)—Great Britain's doubles team of George Patrick Hughes and Fred Perry defeated the Australians, Adrian Quiest and Don Turnbull, 7-5, 6-4, 5-8, 6-3, today to give the mother country a lead of two matches to one in the European zone Davis cup finals. The victory gave Great Britain a commanding lead in the battle for the right to face the United States in the inter-zone finals at Auteuil next week.

With the final pair of singles scheduled for tomorrow, Crawford will have to beat Perry and McGrath must defeat Austin if Australia is to gain the interzone final.

STORY-BOOK CAREER OF GRAPPLER COMES TO END

KUTAW, Ala., July 14.—(AP)—The death of George Kotsonaros in a pro-accident automobile near here closed a story-book career the Greek wrestler pursued on the theory that "When a man's number is up, it's up."

Educated in Athens, Kotsonaros fought in the Balkan war of 1912 against the Turks and saw comrades fall on all sides. "Don't worry," he would say. "When a man's number is up, it's up."

It wasn't up for Kotsonaros in the Balkan war and it wasn't up when he got caught in a street fight in Cairo between Mohammedans and Christians. He was arrested by the Turks but recovered. In his career in the ring and the movies, Kotsonaros had his nose smashed, was in many bad falls and in an airplane crash—but his number wasn't up. A wrestler couldn't fill a date in Nashville, Tenn., this week and Kotsonaros substituted. He was driving to New Orleans with John Paul Jones, Texas wrestler, yesterday.

THYE PINS SCOT IN ROUGH MATCH ON ARMORY MAT

Ted Thye, Portland, came back to take two straight falls, and match, in easy fashion after spotting "Scotty" Dawkins of Boston the first tumble in the main event on last night's wrestling card at the armory. Dawkins, who performed with less buoyancy than he showed in his last match here, took the first fall in 18 minutes with a body press after softening "Terrible Ted" with a series of Sonnenbergs. Thye came back for the second fall, however, and battered Dawkins all over the ring with shoulder butts to make the rough Scott say uncle in six minutes. Dawkins was again the man eater when they came out for the third and deciding fall, sending Thye to the mat several times with rabbit punches and Sonnenbergs, until Thye shot his elbow to "Scotty's" midriff and quickly ended the match with

another series of shoulder butts. The bout was rough, with both men freely using all the tricks of modern joint-wreckers. Dawkins' pet "hold" was a stiff right to the jaw, while it looked to the uninitiated like Thye's best bet was a swift back-handed swipe to the elbow.

A lively exchange of cuffs between Dawkins and Referee Les Weiss was an unadvertised feature on the program. The two came to blows when Referee Weiss doubted "Scotty's" Bostonese culture in trying to drop-kick Thye into the second row seats. Ray Frible, Medford's grappling fireman, and Al Karasick, Russian Lion, went the full hour in the semi-final without a fall, the match ending in a draw. Karasick is probably the best man Frible has met in the local arena, and the fireman looked good in meeting the Russian on even terms.

Early in the bout the pair indulged in a wicked exchange of lefts and rights in a neutral corner, from which Frible emerged with a blood-smear on his face. After this unethical tilt the men stuck to wrestling fairly well, with Frible using a wristlock to advantage and Karasick trying for a fall with his chiropractic headlock. In the closing seconds Frible caught Karasick with a series of Sonnenbergs that left the Russian Lion droopy as the bell ended the match.

Pete Belcastro, belligerent Italian, a favorite performer with local fans, challenged the winner of the main event, or any heavyweight. Swede Anderson climbed into the ring to accept the challenge and Promoter Mack Lillard closed the match on the spot as the semi-windup on next week's all-heavyweight card, which will feature Bob Kruse, Oswego farmer and Bob Nelson of Portland. Despite the warm weather, one of the best crowds of the season witnessed the card.
