SEWER BOND ISSUE TO PROVIDE WORK IN WINTER DAYS

The sewer bond issue upon which the electors of the city will vote on the 28th day of July will accomplish a great deal towards relieving the unemployment situation here in Medford, it was pointed out today by Chamber of Commerce officials. It is estimated that an expenditure of \$100,000 in the sewer system here will give employment for 75 men for an eight month period. To complete the job it will take 90 thousand man working hours.

In addition to this, employment naturally will be created in those plants which supply materials such as sand and gravel plants and others.

The sewer disposal plan worked out by the Chamber of Commerce and passed by the city council is one of many in the Pacific Northwest which it is hoped to finance through the aid of the Reconstruction Finance corporation. In Oregon alone the following cities have applied for funds to either build new sewage systems or rehabilitate old systems: Astoria, Baker, Eugene, McMinnville, Portland, Roseburg, Salem, and Medford. In the state of Washington, over 35 applications have been submitted by communities for funds to perfect sewage systems.

The city of Baker recently voted \$104,000 for a sewage disposal plant and although already approved by the voters, expects to finance it through the R. F. C. It is believed that the employment side of the public works program will be given considerable attention and there can be no doubt, it is pointed out by chamber officials, that a project to employ 75 men for eight months is worthy of earnest thought by the citizens of Medford.
