Medford's American Legion Junior baseball team defeated the highly touted Klamath Falls legion team at the fairgrounds yesterday by the score of 18-8 in a surprise upset. Klamath Falls, by virtue of past performances, was doped to win. The Medford boys, however, got "hot" with both batting and fielding, to sweep the Pelicans nearly off the field.

Medford's team plays Marshfield at Marshfield next Sunday, the winner to play Eugene for the right to enter the state finals. Marshfield also has a good record so far, and many Medford fans are planning on accompanying the boys to the coast city.

## ALL GRAIN TAKES TO HIGHER LEVELS

CHICAGO, July 17.—(AP)—Broad public speculative buying that took in all grains instead of being confined largely to wheat carried every cereal nearly straight upward today.

Wheat gained a maximum of 3/4 cent and reached \$1.27 1/4 a bushel, compared with about 43 cents a bushel early in 1933. Destruction of Canadian wheat crops as result of many adverse conditions was reported as progressing today, and there were also reports that European crops were going backward because of untimely rains. The 1933 wheat production of 12 countries was estimated as 10.1 per cent below 1932.

Wheat closed unsettled, 3 1/4-3 1/2 cents above Saturday's finish, corn 1 1/2-2 1/4 up, oats 1 1/4-1 1/2 advanced, and provisions unchanged to a rise of 20 cents.
