

MANY TOWNS TO SOLVE SEWERAGE PROBLEM FRIDAY

Construction of Modern Disposal Plants Now Possible With Generous Aid of Federal Government

The city of Medford will vote on construction of two new units to the existing sewerage disposal plant, commenced by the state board of health, July 28, a special election having been ordered to submit the matter to the voters.

SALEM, Ore., July 20.—(UP)—Solution of one of Oregon's greatest problems, sewerage disposal, may hinge on the election July 21.

On that date many Oregon cities and towns will vote on construction of modern sewerage plants, provided funds can be obtained from the federal government. Most of the cities are located on the Willamette river, but a number of municipalities in other parts of the state will also consider modern systems.

The general plan to be followed is that cities, if authorized by the voters, will apply for a direct federal grant of 30 per cent of the cost. For the remainder self-liquidating bonds, will be issued. The bonds will be pledged to the reconstruction finance corporation and retired from charges added to water rates.

Pollution of the Willamette river starts at Cottage Grove, more than 100 miles upstream from Portland. Sewage is emptied into the stream at Eugene, Albany, Corvallis, Salem, Oregon City and nearly 100 smaller towns.

Game fish are unable to remain for long in the lower reaches of the Willamette, the water is unfit for use unless it receives heavy chemical treatment, and is generally considered unsafe for swimming in midsummer.

Following the election representatives of the cities voting for sewerage plants, will gather at Salem to discuss application of the federal government. Problems of some towns are complicated by several main sewers emptying into the river. In those places it will be necessary that all main lines be united.
