HARD LIQUOR MAY FLOOD U. S. EARLY
WASHINGTON, July 20.—(UP)—Ratification of the prohibition repeal amendment by the 36th state may lose immediately to thirsty Americans a flood of "hard" liquor.
Justice department officials today confirmed the possibility that on the same day the last required state ratifies repeal, something stronger than three point two will be available legally and without necessity for prescription.
They explained that as soon as the 36th state forwards its ratification, Secretary of State Hull will formally proclaim the 18th amendment voided and the 21st amendment in effect. Liquor then may be sold at once in states without restrictions.

KLAMATH BASIN GETS FREIGHT RATE BOON
KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., July 20.—(UP)—Reductions in freight rates of carload lots of potatoes and onions from the Klamath basin over the Southern Pacific, Great Northern, Western Pacific lines, announced today, will save potato growers of this area \$30,000, it was estimated.
The new rates apply on shipments into California and including Sacramento. They will go into effect as soon as the Interstate commerce commission gives its permission.

AUTOMOBILE DEATHS REACH HIGH LEVEL
WASHINGTON, July 20.—(UP)—Deaths from automobile accidents in the four weeks ended July 8 reached the highest level since January, the department of commerce reported today.
A total of 568 fatalities were registered in the four-week period ended July 8, compared with 735 in the four weeks ended January 21 and the recent peak of 877 in the four weeks ended January 23, 1932.

SALVATION ARMY BARRED IN ULM

ULM, Germany, July 20.—(UP)—Police today prohibited the Salvation Army from holding divine services in the streets and also forbade them from singing or collecting funds in the streets, restaurants or other public places.
The order prohibited the collection boxes customarily used by the Salvation Army.
The chief of police in a formal statement said:
"The public divine service as practiced by the Salvation Army, especially religious songs sung to melodies of vaudeville tunes, is calculated to violate religious feeling."

TRANSIENT WORKERS MUST GET LICENSE
SALEM, Ore., July 20.—(UP)—First arrests were made today under the new motor law against transients working in the state without Oregon licenses for their cars.
Edward J. Sevey and J. L. Zimm, fruit pickers, were fined \$5 each for not purchasing state licenses. The law, passed by the 1933 legislature, provides the plates must be bought by all persons gainfully employed in Oregon, even for only one day.
