

HANSCOM TAKEN TO PENITENTIARY FOR LIFE TERM

Earl Hanscom, 29, husky Eagle Point district farmer, who near midnight on Saturday, July 9, slew his friend and neighbor, Albert J. Tingleaf, middle-aged farmer, left this morning by train for Salem in charge of Deputy Sheriff Phil Lewis, to start serving a life sentence in the state prison. Hanscom Tuesday entered a plea of guilty to second degree murder.

Hanscom battered Tingleaf during a trivial quarrel, until he died from injuries in a local hospital the following day. The fatal fracas occurred outside the dance hall at Eagle Point.

Dressed in a neatly pressed blue suit, and a bright-hued necktie, Hanscom, reconciled to his fate, left the county jail. No friends or kin were present to bid him good-bye. They had said their partings yesterday. He was handcuffed to Deputy Lewis, and bade farewell to the few people about the courthouse this morning.

He was whisked to the Southern Pacific depot and placed aboard the 10:30 northbound passenger train. Reaching Salem early this evening, he will be immediately "dressed in" at the penitentiary.

Hanscom, following his arrest and sentence, was inconsolable, and wept bitterly when arraigned in court. Since then he has gradually adopted a more philosophical attitude, and is contrite and penitent.

Hanscom has lived all his life in this county. A violent temper is blamed by friends for his predicament. Two years ago he came into the news, when his wife filed charges of non-support against him. After several weeks of legal bickering, Hanscom was brought to court, friends interceded, and Circuit Judge Norton paroled him.

His wife and 18-months-old babe, returned to this city from Los Angeles shortly after the slaying.

Merriman Butter Graded Highest

Frank Passmore of Merriman's Dairy announced today that the State Department of Agriculture has just notified them that the proper grade for Merriman's creamery butter is "extra" instead of "standard" as now labeled. The grade for standard butter is from 90 to 92, and the grade for extra is 92 and above. According to Mr. Passmore they are able to reach this high grade only by paying a premium for sweet cream.

SOUTHERN PACIFIC SEES PROFITABLE SEASON FOR FRUIT

That the fruit prospects for Southern Oregon are good, and that the Southern Pacific, by faster schedules and reduction in costs of icing, is co-operating in every way with local growers, to give them a profitable season, were reports brought today by three important S. P. officials who, under the guidance of A. S. Rosenbaum, district agent, called on local leaders in the pear industry today.

The visiting officials included: W. W. Hale of Portland, freight traffic manager; W. C. Fitch of San Francisco, general agent in charge of perishable fruit; and R. J. Martin, general manager of the Pacific Fruit express.

In the line of faster service to the eastern markets, the delegation released the following announcement: "Southern Pacific and Union Pacific have succeeded in working out a schedule for handling this year's pear crop that will put Rogue river district in what is known as 'zone one,' and which will result in reaching New York in time for tenth morning delivery instead of eleventh morning as formerly. The new schedule will also result in seventh morning team track delivery at Chicago, although there will be no change in schedule affecting cars destined Chicago, which will remain on basis of eighth morning delivery.

"This reduction in running time has been made possible, due to improved condition of Southern Pacific's new Alturas line and co-operation on part of Union Pacific in correspondingly speeding up service on their part of the through route."
