MINERS IN PLEA FOR GOLD EXPORT

Of interest to mining men of southern Oregon is action taken by the Associated Mining Associations of California to obtain federal permission for exportation of gold by the producers, local miners announced today.

A bill is now being framed by the association, George Barton of the Southern Oregon association stated, and will be presented to congress. If such a bill is approved, mining men will be able to enter their earnings in the world market and will realize 50 or 60 per cent more for their product. Although no definite action has been taken by the Southern Oregon Mining association in that direction, the members are watching eagerly the progress of the California bill. Mr. Barton stated, as such legislation would mean much to this section, bringing about an important increase in gold production.
