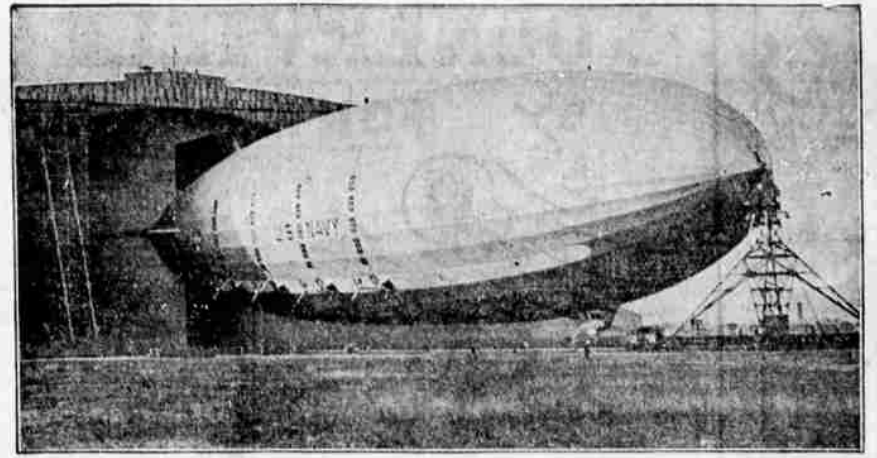
THE MACON VISITS HOME OF ILL-FATED AKRON

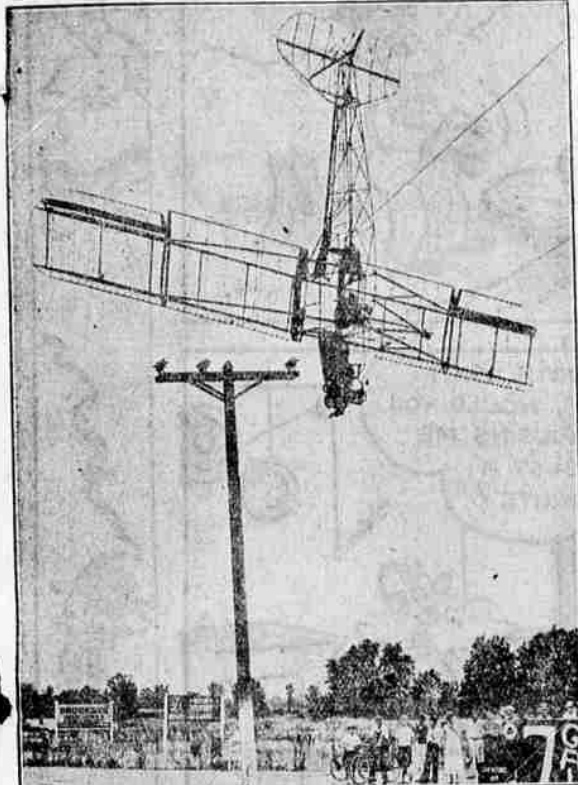

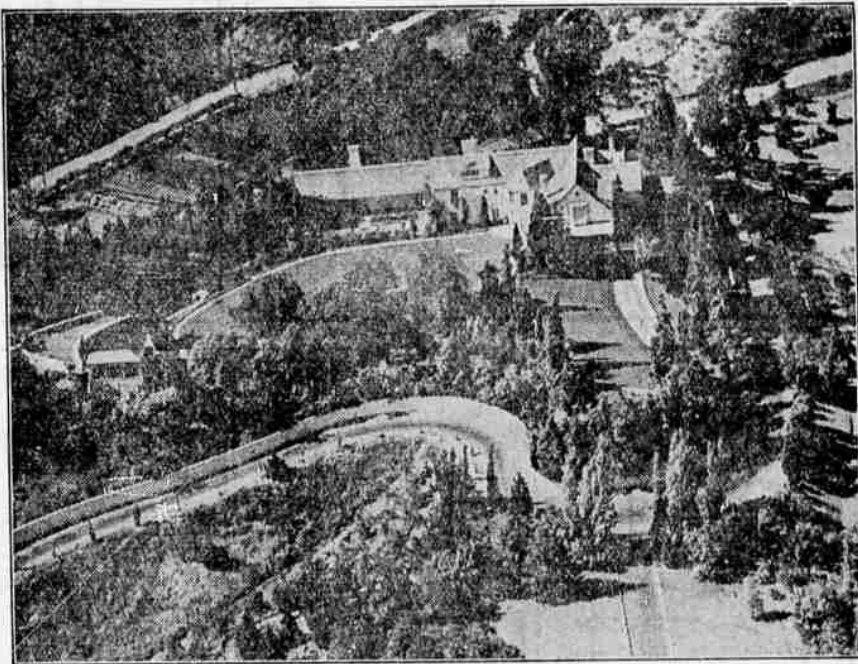
CALL COTTON ACREAGE REDUCTION SCHEME SUCCESS
