United Press Staff Correspondent. NEW YORK, July 22.—(UP)—Primo Carnera, heavyweight champion of the world, stood on the stage of a Broadway vaudeville house today and, in accents profound and guttural, informed his audience that "I daunt know what for I am doing up here anyway."

Yet for 15 minutes, the perpendicular aqueduct of Italy went through every evidence that he may turn into a likely comedian, possibly with southern dialect.

Surrounded by stooges, sparring partners, masters of ceremonies, trainers, managers, competing comedians and a juggler, the world's champ answered questions, offered to fight anyone in the audience (laughter), described the blow which felled Jack Sharkey, and stepped two ragged rounds with as many sparring partners.

A curly-haired master of ceremonies did most of the questioning. He asked Carnera what happened immediately after the Sharkey fight.

"Yes, suh!" exclaimed the champ, lapsing into southern Carolinian. "From the knockout I go right to my dressing room, call up by the Atlantic telephone my mother, tell her how it come out, yeh, suh!"

"Tell us, Primo," urged the master of ceremonies, "when you intend to defend your heavyweight championship." Primo flung up his great arms.

"Enna time, enna place, emboldy! Y-a-a-a suh. Go places, do things! (Cheering, laughter)."

They then entered a discussion of the Carnera family, and Primo told about his 10-year-old brother. "How tall is he Primo?" asked the
