

Medford Plays Colored Giants at Fairgrounds 5:30 This Evening

TWILIGHT CLASH PROMISES FANS FAST BASEBALL

Invaders Boast Best Talent in Country of Color—Local Team Strengthened by Several Valley Stars

Medford fans will have an opportunity of witnessing some real baseball playing this evening at 5:30 when the Gillerson's Colored Giants meet the Rogues at the fairgrounds.

The Colored Giants team is composed of the best negro players in the entire United States, every player being of major league caliber, but due to color, are barred from organized leagues.

Jack Hughes to Pitch. Manager Haight will present the strongest lineup yet to take the field at the fairgrounds this year. Jack Hughes, local boy, who does his pitching at Grants Pass, will hurl with Ogle, his battery mate, behind the plate. Haight has also secured the services of Hooper Hoffer and Bud Conlin of the Eagle Point team. If the team performs as well as they did yesterday when they downed the league-leading Coquille team, they should be able to give the negro slavers a battle.

Large Turnout Needed. Baseball is gradually coming back to its own in Medford, due largely to the efforts of Manager Haight, who was instrumental in organizing the Southern Oregon league, which has brought better teams and better games to Medford. In signing the Colored Giants here, Haight is bringing in one of the outstanding teams in the United States. Medford should reciprocate by turning out for the game. Let's pack the old grandstand as in days of old. Due to the heavy expense involved in bringing in this great team, the admission for the game will be slightly increased.

AMERICAN TENNIS HOPE IS BLASTED; VINES COLLAPSES

AUTEUIL, France, July 24.—(AP)—For the second time in three years, England's twin tennis ace, Fred Perry and H. W. Bundy Austin, have failed America's bid to regain the Davis cup in the interzone finals.

Just as they did in 1931, but under circumstances even more dramatic, Austin and Perry smashed through to victories in both of the final singles matches before a record crowd in Roland Garros stadium yesterday, gaining one by default through the collapse of the American champion, Ellsworth Vines, won the series four matches to one, and gained the right to battle France in the challenge round Friday, Saturday and Sunday.

To Austin went the honor of clinching the series and ending for another year America's hopes of recapturing the trophy France has held ever since the "Four Musketeers," Rene Lacoste, Henri Cochet, Jean Borotra and Jacques Brugnon, won it at Germantown in 1927.

Meeting Wilmer Allison in the first match of the day, with Great Britain holding a 2-1 lead, Austin polished off the Texan in four sets, 1-7, 6-3, 6-4, but all the drama, oddly enough, was concentrated in the second and third sets, which were as meaningless though it was after Austin's clinching triumph.

Fighting to regain the prestige he lost through the terrific beating he took against Austin in the opening singles match Friday, Vines fought Perry point for point until he suddenly fainted from nervous exhaustion and the pain of an injured ankle with Perry at set point in the fourteenth game of the fifth set. His long arms stretched full length in the red dust, officials hurriedly applied wet towels to his face, then carried him to the clubhouse where he quickly revived.

Perry was awarded the victory, 1-6, 6-0, 4-6, 7-3, 7-6 default.

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Western Open at Memphis Revives Memories of 1920

By Dillon Graham (Associated Press Sports Writer) MEMPHIS, Tenn. (AP)—For the second time in its history the Western Amateur Golf championship will be played in Dixie this year, over the Memphis country club course, starting July 24.

Back in 1920, Memphis was host to the tournament in its first visit to the south. Then Bobby Jones was medalist and Chick Evans won the title.

The same Charles (Chick) Evans of Chicago, past his prime but still a very respected contender, likely will be among the fast field that lines up for the 36-hole qualifying round. Jones' competitive days are over, but just for old times' sake Moe may be asked to play an exhibition round with Evans prior to the tourney.

Gus Morland of Dallas, the young Walker cup star who won the crown a year ago, will be ready to defend his honors, while there is a possibility that Ira Couch, his final round opponent of last summer, also will enter.

Goodman Invited. Don Moe of Portland, Ore., twice-champion, will be seeking another title. John Lehman of Chicago, medalist last year and champion in 1930, also may be a contender. Two

others likely to participate are Charley Yates, Georgia champion of 1932; Eugene Vinson, Mississippi's best; Edwin McClure of Shreveport, La.; Billy Howell of Richmond, Va.; and Ralph Redmond of St. Petersburg, Fla., who recently won the Southern championship.

Accuracy will count heavily over the championship layout, where par is 70. The player who is hitting his shots straight should have little trouble, says Walter Sherwood, club professional.

240-Yard One-Shotter. Sherwood is allowing his Bermuda grass to grow tall and the rough will be especially uninviting by tournament time. The greens and fairways are thoroughly protected by sand and traps.

Holes 10 and 15 are the hardest. No. 10 is a one-shotter, 240 yards, with sand on all sides of the green and another 37 yards in front of the carpet. No. 15 is a 432-yard dog leg to the left.

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DEMPSEY, BAER MAY POST CUPS FOR AMATEURS

The foremost fistie idols in America, Jack Dempsey and Max Baer, have been invited to put up special trophies in the American Legion's big relief fund benefit Golden Gloves championship amateur boxing tournament to be held in the Armory arena here night of Aug. 14, 15, and 16, Lea Showers, tourney chief, declared today.

Himself a former amateur, Dempsey is expected to offer a trophy for the winner of the heavyweight title in the huge amateur event here. Baer has been asked to present a special award for the most popular champion of the big meet.

Billy Sandow, who took Ed (Strangler) Lewis to the world's mat throne, has asked Director Showers to scout the heavyweight class of the tournament here and put him in touch with the winner of the man-mountain division. Showers, who served as expedition director for Sandow for a while, claims Billy is now on the lookout for a young American hope to groom for a try to bring back the world's heavyweight title to the United States.

"There never was a better time than now for young heavies to begin a grand march up the pugilistic highway, and inasmuch as practically all great ringmen are amateurs, we expect a large number of big fellows on hand for the enrollment meeting Thursday night of this week," Showers said.

"There are to be classes in all weight divisions in the tourney and all matches are to be arranged according to age, weight and ability as the specialists arrive on nights of the big meet. The bouts are to be for three two-minute rounds and 10 to 20 hot fights will make up the program each night of the mittfest. All professionals are barred from the tourney. It will cost nothing to report to Lea Showers and Dick Russell at an open training camp to be erected on the playground near the Main street bridge, at 7:30 Thursday night, and to enroll for the expert training as well as for a chance to take part in the leather-pushing jamboree. Everything is free to the contestants.

Bend Elks Leading Baseball League

BEND, Ore., July 24.—(AP)—The Bend Elks slugged their way into undisputed first place in the Oregon state baseball league standings Sunday by defeating Eugene's Townies 19 to 5. 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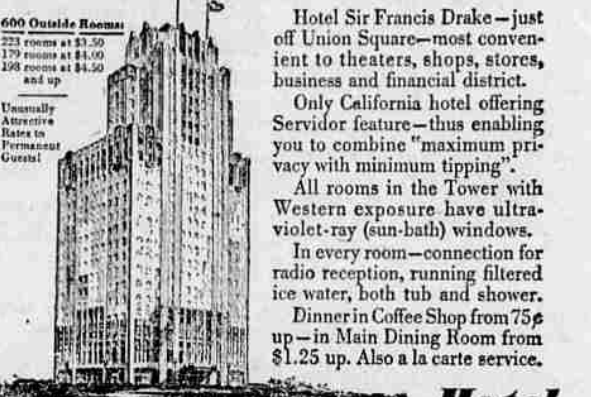
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DE MAGGIO'S HIT MARK PUSHED TO 60 GAMES
