DENY REHEARING TELEGRAM CASE

SALEM, Ore., July 25.—(AP)—Petitions for rehearing in the case of Thomas B. Mannix against the Portland Telegram and the state against C. A. DeGrace were denied by the Oregon supreme court here today in oral opinions. No comments were made in handing down these opinions.

Mannix won judgment against the Portland Telegram for \$32,500 in a suit for libel. The supreme court affirmed the judgment in a previous opinion.

DeGrace, formerly president of the Prudential Savings and Loan group, was sentenced to four years in the state penitentiary and fined \$1000 on charges of devising a scheme to defraud. The suit was brought against him by the state corporation department. In a previous opinion the lower court was affirmed.

# AMATEUR BOXING TOURNAMENT PORTAL TO RING CAREER

A pair of reasons why so many aspiring boxers are anxious to sign up for the big event is because the American Legion's great relief fund benefit Golden Gloves championship amateur boxing tournament at the Medford Armory next month is the first stepping stone toward the national championships in New York City and the Olympic Games two years hence in Berlin, Germany.

The tournament, set for nights of Aug. 14, 15, and 16, is open for amateur athletes only and those whose amateur status is not free of taint of professionalism are to be barred from the ring revival. Elegant trophies, trips to other tournaments, expert training, all go free to the ringsters. The Medford amateurs are to enroll at an open-air training camp to be set up today or tomorrow on the playground near the Main street bridge at 7:30 Thursday night. It costs nothing to sign up and to compete.

Dick Russell, director of out-of-town activities for the big meet, in a few days will journey to Ashland, Grants Pass, Klamath Falls, and all other points in southern Oregon to organize teams of boxers for the hostilities here. There will be from 15 to 20 thrilling three-round fights on each night of the tournament here with all matches being arranged according to age, weight, and ability as the spectators put in appearance for the bouts. Amateurs from the same city or town will not compete against each other unless they first eliminate all other contestants of like poundage. Carl Y. Tengwald, chairman of the tournament committee, announced today.

On leaving Medford today, Mr. Mashburn stated that he regretted the moving away from this city, but that his new location will better handle the supervision of the newly created and enlarged southern Oregon territory.

"The new set-up will enable me to accomplish much in our program of encouraging exchange of produce between the various sections of southern Oregon," Mr. Mashburn said. "We are sure that the district in Klamath and Lake counties and in northern California will afford an excellent outlet for Rogue River valley products and I mean to do my utmost to further open this great outlet."

# Mary Pickford Will Head Craterian Cast

In writing about "Secrets" the new Mary Pickford production which opens its four-day run at the Craterian theater tomorrow, it is noteworthy to quote the Hollywood Reporter in his review of the picture.

He says "A steady thunder of applause signals the fadeout of a picture that held the audience unawares for an hour and a half.
