GETCHELL FIRST SEE FOOD VALUE OF ROGUE PEARS

It was more than a year ago that Medford people were made aware of the medicinal food qualities of the southern Oregon pear, which are now attracting so much attention throughout the Pacific northwest. It was recalled here today. The attention of the public was drawn to the pear by an interview with Delroy Getchell, president of the Farmers and Fruitgrowers banks, published in the Mail Tribune.

In
