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RAILROAD PLANS LINKED TO PLEA FOR HARBOR AID

GRANTS PASS, July 27.—(AP)—Testing before an army engineering board headed by Lieut.-Colonel H. A. Finch assisted by two captains and a major in his department, delegates from Grants Pass and Medford yesterday brought up to date the data on this interior section's plea for a tidewater outlet to open in the Rogue and Klamath valleys a producing area the size of an ordinary state as the army engineers were told. Authorized by a recent congressional committee act, the hearing was held simultaneously with Washington, D. C. Consideration of an application to the R. F. C. for a \$5,000,000 fund for rail construction from here to the Crescent City harbor, and to the I. C. C. for a certificate permitting work to begin. Prospects that harbor authorization and construction might proceed in concert with rail-laying were voiced by delegates returning from the coast hearing today.

Star witness for the general plan was W. H. Gore of Medford, who was assisted by C. H. Demaray of Grants Pass, receiver for the C. and O. C. railroad already extending part way to the port. W. H. Muirhead of the Beaver-Portland Cement company at Gold Hill who discussed freight rates, W. F. Hayden of Grants Pass on mining tonnage, City Attorney James T. Chinnock for the city's railroad interests, and William Holmes, local Standard Oil manager, on petroleum product tonnages.

WHEAT ALLOTMENT FIGURES ANNOUNCED

WASHINGTON, July 27.—(AP)—Secretary Wallace today announced production allotments totaling 456,198,888 bushels in 42 states and 2233 counties as the basis on which benefit payments will be made to farmers under the voluntary domestic allotment plan put in force by the farm administrators.

The state allotment by bushels, under the wheat plan includes: Oregon, 11,450,588.

SMELTABLE GOLD NOT EXPORTABLE, IS RULE
