

WATER PERMITS SHOW INCREASE OREGON MINING

State Engineer Reports 53 Given Sanction for Partial Use of Streams in First Half of This Year

SALEM, Ore.—(UP)—The United States may be off the gold standard, but that doesn't worry Oregon miners, who are showing more activity than for many years, milling and mulling in an effort to make the earth give up her hoardings.

Report of the state engineer shows that during the first half of this year 23 water permits, aggregating \$25,25 second feet, were issued to individuals and corporations for mining purposes in Oregon. A number of other permits were issued and later cancelled.

Means Big Supply A second foot of water calls for use of approximately 27,200 gallons per hour. New permits were issued to individuals and corporations for mining purposes in Oregon. A number of other permits were issued and later cancelled.

Water is used for washing sand and gravel in sluice boxes, leaving gold particles in the bottom. It is also used in placer mining, pumped with great force against banks of gold-bearing sand or gravel. Most permits issued have been for 2.0 second feet, though a number have been much larger.

Jobless Turn to Mining Revival of gold mining in Oregon is attributed largely to unemployment, which has made men eager to find any kind of work, even if returns may be small. Operating costs have also declined, making it possible to work with some profit where gold deposits are of very low per cent.

Greatest activity, the permits indicate, is in southwestern and northwestern Oregon. Permits in Josephine county total 197.25 second feet. Union county's come to 109, Grant 94, Douglas 72. Total water filings from other counties include Wheeler 20, Baker 13, Coos 10, Jackson 6, Curry 3, Rogue 5.

Large water permit issued by the state engineer was to A. B. Carter, Portland, for 125 second feet from five tributaries of Rogue river in Josephine county. Second largest was to John J. Dann, La Grande, 92.5 second feet from four tributaries of Grande Ronde river in Union county.

Other large permits issued during the six months were to Two Jacks Mining company, 20 second feet, from Rock creek in Wheeler county; S. B. Herman, 10 second feet from Johnson creek in Coos county; Fred Feikert, Portland, 20 second feet, from three tributaries of Coye creek in Douglas county.

N. W. Cole, Grants Pass, 12 second feet from Granite creek in Josephine; James C. Garfield, Azalea, 50 second feet from Starvout creek in Douglas; E. E. Young, Wonder, 30 second feet from Secret creek in Josephine; George E. Thomas, John Day, 45 second feet from John Day river in Grant; C. L. Ruddick, Canyon City, 30 second feet from four tributaries of John Day river in Grant.

Total number of water permits for all purposes issued thus far this year is 197. Aside from mining, most of the water appropriated is for irrigation. Fire protection, municipal and domestic use, power, swimming pools, livestock, and lily, duck and frog ponds are among the other uses listed.

RACE INCREASING FOR PUBLIC WEAL URGED BY NAZIS

Hitler Regime Points to Declining Birth Rate in Opening Campaign for More and Better German Babies

BERLIN (AP)—Emphasizing the nation's declining birth rate, the Nazi regime of Adolf Hitler has started a campaign of education aimed at more and better babies for Germany.

Earnest appeals for well filled cradles have been directed especially toward the rural population, "for," says one of the official communiques, "a nation can survive all blows of fate if its peasant stock is sound."

Claims National Right "What is imperatively needed is a constant healthy rejuvenation of the peasantry," said Wilhelm Frick, Prussian minister of the interior. "It was so in the time of Frederick the Great, when the cry was 'the king needs soldiers,' and it is so now."

"The state has the right to demand from those who till the soil that they shall produce healthy offspring and plenty of them."

Frick made this statement in addressing the first meeting of a commission of experts on population and racial policy.

He began by pointing out that the number of births in Germany had declined from 2,000,000 per annum 30 years ago to 975,000.

The birth rate of 36 a thousand has dropped to 15. The average German family has shrunk from 2 or 3 children to one or no-child.

Deficient on Increase "A most important and alarming feature of the present situation," Frick continues, "is the mating of the bodily or mentally deficient."

"Some authorities place the proportion of hereditarily unsound in Germany as high as 20 per cent of the whole population. It would seem that sound stock is shrinking from generation to generation and is doomed to die out. That would be the end of German Kultur."

"From an agrarian state we have changed to an industrial state. The industrialization of the nation has brought in its wake money worship, individualism, class antagonism, Marxism, communism and the decline of family life."

"Public opinion applauds women in business and sports. It takes but little interest in the wife and mother. We shall change all that."

Declares 'Maudlin Charity' Frick said that each criminal cost the state 3.50 marks; each lunatic 4 marks, each crippled person or deaf mute 5 to 6 marks a day, whereas the unskilled laborer had to be content with a wage of 2.50 marks and the lower class employe or official with 4 marks.

"Modern humanitarianism which allows the weak and degenerate to propagate their kind is nothing less than cruelty to the nation," he asserted. "We shall refuse to be bound by mauldin notions of charity or by selfish church dogmas."

"Husbands," Frick declared, "must be given jobs, and wives must get back to housework. The big family ideal must be revived throughout the land."

"Too long a period of professional training is just as bad for the timely founding of a family as too much time given up to sports."
