Nealon also testified that on the afternoon, before the ballot theft, he became suspicious of groups huddled about the corridors of the courthouse, and he asked E. E. Gore of Medford, to watch them, while he transacted business in the district attorney's office. About six o'clock, he came out, and Gore told him there was a

group in the county court. The commissioner said he bore no bitterness towards Fehl, that when both assumed office, they had agreed to work together, but it failed, that he bore no hatred towards Fehl, or "anybody else, though there are plenty of people, I feel sorry for."
