EX-SOLON HIDES IDENTITY AFTER STRUCK BY AUTO

NEW YORK, Aug. 1.—(AP)—The motive that led Karl Cortlandt Schuyler, former United States Senator from Colorado, to veil his identity 11 days as he lay dying from injuries inflicted by an automobile, remained undetermined today. The 56-year-old lawyer and business man, a leading figure in Denver for years, died last night at Lenox Hill hospital. The cause of death was a fractured pelvis suffered when an automobile knocked him down in Central Park July 17.

Schuyler declined at first to go to a hospital and when he finally consented, police and hospital authorities said, he was entered under the name of "James Evans." Last Friday, when informed that his condition was grave, he identified himself to hospital attendants and asked that his wife in Colorado Springs be notified.

Mrs. Schuyler, the former Alsenia Sheppard of Colorado Springs, hurried to New York and with a son, Karl C. Schuyler, Jr., was present when he died. They planned to take the body to Denver today.

Schuyler, who was registered at the St. Regis hotel, was walking in Central Park when an automobile driven by Frank Spangnoll knocked him down. Spangnoll was not held.

JULY PERMITS SHOW INCREASE

Eleven building permits were issued in the city of Medford for the month of July, totaling in money \$8615, records at the city building department revealed today.

This amount is a substantial increase over last year's record of 2303 for 10 permits issued in July. Two new permits were issued the last day of last month, going to Arthur Short of 319 South Laurel for fire repairs, amounting to \$40; and to L. C. Anderson of 433 South Fir for construction of a lunch stand at the cost of \$400.

PUBLIC WORKS COIN ALLOTMENTS MADE

WASHINGTON, Aug. 1.—(AP)—The public works administration allotted nearly \$100,000,000 today to carry forward three of the outstanding public works projects in the United States, the largest being \$63,000,000 for the Grand Coulee dam project for power and irrigation on the Columbia river, approved last week by President Roosevelt.

For the Casper-Alcova reclamation project \$22,700,000 was allotted and an immediate allotment of \$11,500,000 was made for the nine-foot channel on the Upper Mississippi river.

KANSAS CITY, Kas., Aug. 1.—(AP)—Elwood D. King, who went for the doctor when former President Hoover was born, died here at his home last night. He was 81 years old, and prior to his retirement several years ago, was a furniture salesman.

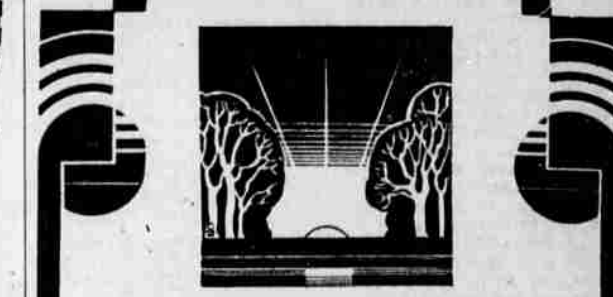
