

### JULY FEATURED BY CLEAR SKIES WARM WEATHER

Monthly meteorological notes for July, as compiled by W. J. Hutcheson, local meteorologist, show clear skies and warm dry weather with temperatures somewhat above normal prevailed throughout the month. Daily maximum temperatures averaged slightly higher than usual. The daily average minimum for the month is noticeably high, having been exceeded in 23 years of record only in two previous years. The highest temperature to date for the year 1933 occurred on the 14th when the maximum temperature recorded 104 degrees. The lowest temperature for July was observed at 47 degrees on the 10th.

Comparatively high day temperatures and the absence of precipitation during the month depleted soil moisture rapidly in the valley and along the lower slopes of the surrounding mountains. Higher mountain ranges continued to hold up fairly well. Water for irrigation appears plentiful and where used sufficiently crop development is making satisfactory gains, although the season remains about two weeks late. Weather conditions were excellent for harvesting and threshing of grains.

No measurable amount of precipitation fell during July. On the 7th and 8th very light showers of short duration occurred and were recorded as traces. Normally rainfall should total 0.36 inches for the month. This shortage increased the seasonal precipitation deficiency to 2.96 inches at the close of July. The seasonal total stands at 14.88 inches.

Although drying conditions prevailed through the month hazardous fire weather was at a minimum, due to a great extent to the percentage of relative humidity, for the most part, remaining in the higher figures. Also, the absence of thunder and lightning storms in the high mountains diminished the fire hazard. Forest fires, usually prevalent in July, were notably scarce, in the vicinity.

### SHIP MODELS IN C. OF C. WINDOWS MADE BY WOODS

Two very interesting ship models are on display this week in the chamber of commerce windows at Front and Main streets. The largest one of the two is a full scale model of the "E" type of wartime United States submarine, which is equipped with two screw propellers, driven by an electric motor that obtains its power from batteries. The ship which beautifully finished in great detail, is seven feet long and is a practical working model capable of operation under its own power in any water over six inches deep.

The other model displayed is of the yacht Enterprise which won the International Yachting cup from England's entry Shamrock V, commanded by Sir Thomas Lipton. This model is over four feet from the bottom of the keel to the top of the mast and is equipped with an automatic rudder so that it is capable of sailing and maintaining direction in the water.

The story behind the creation of these models is interesting and should carry a vision of romantic adventure to the individual who spends his winters in the comfort and convenience of his home surrounded by his fellow beings. Chas. A. Woods is the clever author of these miniature ships and his regular occupation does not faintly suggest such artistic capabilities as those shown in the creation of such difficult and interesting objects. These models were built last winter, in the line patrol cabin number 90 of the California Oregon Power company on top of the mountain where the Cascade range meets the Siskiyou. Four miles by snow shoes from the nearest highway, this cabin lies buried in the snow nearly all winter long. It is maintained by the California Oregon Power company as one of the several patrol cabins situated along the power transmission lines over the mountains. A break in one of these lines may mean serious inconvenience to thousands of people. To minimize the possibility of any interruption in service these patrol cabins, occupied by such men as Mr. Woods, are maintained. The high altitude at which the line crosses the divide makes the winter condition, at times, attain almost Arctic severity. These copco patrolmen must possess stamina, courage and devotion to duty of an exceptional degree. Every day regardless of weather, through clear, biting cold or driving, swirling snow, the line must be patrolled, so that those who depend upon the modern necessity of electric service shall have this service at the turn of the switch, day or night. In fact the worse the weather, the more necessary it is that the line be patrolled. These models executed with such delicacy of touch and in such intricate detail, were made by Patrolman Woods during the long winter evenings, after the day's patrol had been made.

Most of the way across the Atlantic and all the way across the American continent en route home from a seven months' tour of foreign lands
