

CLASHES ENLIVEN CROSS EXAMINING OF FEHL IN TRIAL

Direct examination of Fehl was completed by mid-morning. Fehl testified that he did not learn of the ballot robbery until about 9:30 o'clock, and that he was busy for two hours before that attending to private and official business about Medford.

Fehl said three days of that week he was in Salem conferring with the governor and other state officials on the alleviation of unemployment in his home county.

Got Sextons Jobs

The witness admitted he had been instrumental in securing jobs for the Sexton brothers around the court house that he dismissed a minor charge against them and that he had never suggested to them that they steal the ballots. The Sextons are two of the state's chief witnesses in the case.

The defendant reviewed at some length the details of his arrest, and relief work activities.

It is expected that the state will conclude its rebuttal evidence this afternoon. Twenty additional witnesses have been called for this purpose.

Indications are that the case will be in the hands of the jury late Friday or by noon Saturday.

LEGION ENLISTS IN N. R. A. RANKS

HIDE PARK, N. Y., Aug. 3.—(AP)—The soldiers of the American Legion informed President Roosevelt tonight of their "battle orders" to fight the war of the depression and he, in turn hailed their support with "supreme faith."

Louis Johnson, national commander of the American Legion, informed Mr. Roosevelt of his "battle orders" to the 10,760 posts calling them into immediate action "to offer their loyal cooperation and services to the official representatives of the national relief administration in their respective communities and to cooperate in achieving its objectives."

NEWSPAPER CODE PHASES CLEARED

WASHINGTON, Aug. 3.—(AP)—Recovery administration officials expressed the opinion today they had sufficiently clarified the position of newspapers in relation to the president's voluntary reemployment agreement to open the way for publishers to come in without difficulty.

A ruling today permitted publishers who have contracts with their mechanical forces, arrived at by collective bargaining, to keep these in force even under the blanket agreement if the way is not open to modification. If the contracts provide for a definite number of work hours per week, 48 for instance, work may proceed on that basis. If they merely provide a rate per hour, publishers will be expected to reduce the work week to 35 hours with an upward adjustment of pay rates, though this need not necessarily bring the total weekly earnings up to the 48-hour level.

In regard to news forces the present intention of the administration was described as leaving to each publisher decision on bringing them under a work week limit.

Jewelers Agree.

Jewelers of Medford have agreed to adhere strictly to the wage code adopted by local employers last Saturday, they announced, following a conference this afternoon. The 40-hour week for employees and the 8 a. m. to 5 p. m. store open hours

agreed on then, will be observed, at least until further announcement of the jeweler's national code is received from Washington.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 3.—(AP)—While only minor damage was done, fire today on the Union Iron Works wharf in the Bethlehem shipyard here threatened for a time the safety of \$5,000,000 worth of ships, including the Matson liners Matsonia and Maui, former flagships of the line.

SALEM, Aug. 3.—(AP)—The third initiative petition to amend sections of the small loan act was filed here today, seeking to cut down the legal rate of interest on small loans.

BOOK BY BANKS REVEALS TREND

EUGENE, Aug. 3.—(AP)—Titled "Weighed in the Balance," and dealing with the principles of government and the trends of national events, a book written by Llewellyn A. Banks has come from the press.

Soon after he was convicted on a second degree murder charge for the slaying of a Medford constable as the climax of a political embroilment in which he was the ring-leader, Banks announced he would write a book. He was formerly editor of the Medford News and operator of orchard tracts.

"Weighed in the Balance" has no reference to the factional disturbance which rocked Jackson county, nor any mention of Banks' implication in this trouble.
