FIGHT KIDNAPERS ON TWO FRONTS

CHICAGO, Aug. 4.—(AP)—The federal government plans its own racket offensive along two fronts—vigorous enforcement of federal laws and close co-operation with authorities in every community.

Joseph B. Keenan, assistant attorney general in charge of the government's campaign to stamp out crime, told the closing session of the international association of chiefs of police last night that the administration was "in dead earnest" in the drive and it "will not permit substitution of a government of the underworld in place of lawfully constituted authority."

Writer of Sea Thrillers Himself Wreck Victim

PORTLAND, Aug. 4.—(AP)—Shipwrecks, the pounding sea and jetsam the rolling waves cast upon the shores—they have for several years been fine material for Albert Richard Wetjen, who writes a dashing story of the sea.

There have been thrilling rescues from cold waters in inky darkness, after near despair.

It now develops that the Portland and Salem author, who followed the sea before he turned to write about it, himself was wrecked and nearly drowned last Wednesday night in the black waters of the Willamette river.

Mrs. Wetjen, another survivor, told the story.

With another couple, the Wetjens took their motorboat downtown to meet the frigate Constitution. Later they decided on another cruise. The night was black. The cruiser, hitting a fine pace, crashed into a stray log. In four minutes the boat sank.

The four floundered in the water and finally reached the very log that had caused their grief.

Great shouts and screams echoed over the water. After 30 minutes, or so, help came. A boatman drew

alongside and aided each into his craft. Dick Wetjen, his wife confided, had considerable difficulty scaling the side of the rescue boat.

"He's sort of stout," she laughed. "We thought he was in a bad way for awhile."
