CODE ON LAUNDRY LABOR IS JUNKED BY NRA CHIEFTAIN

WASHINGTON, Aug. 4.—(AP)—The recovery administration today withdrew its approval, granted only yesterday, to immediate application of labor terms of a code proposed by the laundry industry upon discovering the agreement actually provided for wages as low as 14 cents an hour.

By some as yet unexplained oversight not only the deputy administrator, who had handled the code, but Dr. Leo Wolman, chairman of the recovery administration's labor advisory board, approved the agreement without discovering how low a wage rate actually was called for.

The laundry men will be expected to offer either a radical revision upward immediately or to come in under the blanket presidential agreement if they wish to display the distinctive blue eagle insignia of the N. R. A.

The proposal, which was promulgated yesterday, was represented as restoring employment to thousands of women and girls and adding millions of dollars to payrolls.

CULINARY CRAFT....

Sweet Pickles
300 2-inch cucumbers
2-3 c salt
Boiling water to cover
1/2 gallon vinegar
1/2 c mustard
1/2 c salt
1-3 c sugar
1/2 c mixed spices
1 ginger root
3 lbs. sugar

Scrub the cucumbers clean then dry them and place in a large pan. Sprinkle the salt over them, stirring to get it thru evenly, then cover with boiling water and allow to stand over night. In the morning remove the brine and wipe the pickles dry then lay them in a crock. Mix the 1/2 cup of mustard, salt and 1-3 cup of sugar together and blend with the vinegar. Sprinkle the mixed spices over the pickles and place the ginger root on top then pour the vinegar mixture over all. Stir well so that each pickle is immersed. Set away in a cool place. Each morning add one handful of the 3 lbs. of sugar until all is used, stirring well each time. Store in open crocks or seal. (These keep their color well and are crisp and delicious.)

Jewish Dill Pickles
Place fresh cucumbers in quart jars and to each jar add
3 cloves of garlic
3 small hot peppers
3 bunches of dill
1/4 t powdered alum

Watermelon Pickles
Remove the green skin and ripe pulp from watermelon rinds then cut in one and one-half inch strips. Cover with one cup of salt and enough water to cover. Let stand over night then drain and cook in clear water until tender. Make a syrup of 3/4 lbs. sugar
1 qt. cider vinegar
8 drops oil of cinnamon
8 drops oil of cloves
1 T grain alcohol

(The oils and alcohol may be purchased at a drug store already combined.)
Pour all over the melon rinds, boil one and one-half hours slowly, then seal.

Easy Mustard Pickles
100 small cucumbers
1 gal. mild vinegar
1 c sugar
1 c salt
1 c mustard
2 t saccharine

Place the clean cucumbers in small jars, cover with the mixture of vinegar and spices and seal.
