Oliver Rebeckah To Meet Monday.

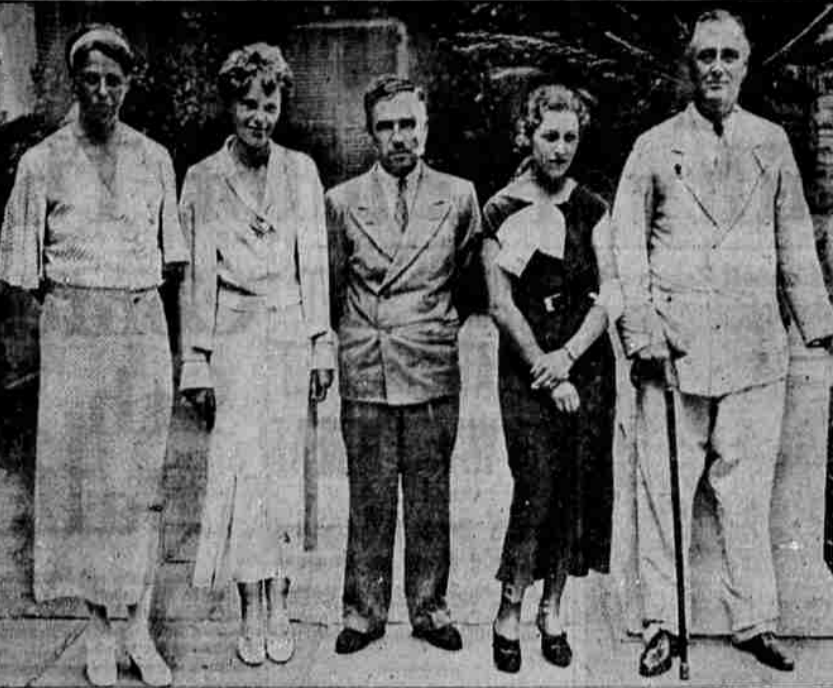
The Oliver Rebeckah lodge will hold regular meeting Monday evening at the I. O. O. F. hall. All members are invited to attend and visitors will be welcomed.
