

LOCAL FIGHTERS IN TIP-TOP FORM FOR SOCK FIESTA

Public Workouts Give Simon Pures Opportunity for Conditioning Process—Big Boys Entering Lists

Referee a secret. Declaring "the tourney is so big and the fighters have so much at stake, the identity of the referees will not be made known until time for them to enter the ring Monday night." Lee Garlock, Medford Legion commander, made it clear the names of the third men in the ring for the grand opening of the great amateur tourney at the Armory here Monday night are to be kept well hidden until the opening bell.

In shape right now to wage the most vicious brand of ring warfare, Medford's amateur fighting men last night went into the final week of training at the open-air camp near the East Main street bridge, in preparation for their grueling struggles with the invading foe from out-of-town points in the official opening of the American Legion's great relief fund benefit championship amateur boxing tournament on the Medford Armory field of honor here next Monday night. Another big free public workout is booked for tonight at 7:30.

"The Out-Towners shall not pass," is the war cry of Medford's favorites, as they make ready to repel the attack of the "enemy" on the Armory battlefield here Monday night. The invaders are just as determined that they, and not Medford, will hammer their way to victory in the grand opening Monday night. A card of 15 to 20 wild and furious fights will make up the program, the first starting promptly at 8:15 and the last ending not later than 10:30.

No Comp Tickets. No complimentary tickets, except to the press and officials of the event are to be given out, Carl Y. Tengwald, tourney chairman, declared today. This is such a big meet it is costing so much money to promote it, and is for such a fine cause that anyone seeing the fights will have to pay for the privilege," Tengwald declared. And he meant it, too.

Crack amateur fighters from Illinois, Indiana, Kentucky and other states will be represented by the C. C. C. camp fighters. Several of the Illinois fighters already are in town. Portland Giants in.

A pair of terrific punching man-mountains from Portland—"Big" Ben Shafer, giant plasterer, and Tony Acuardi, powerful Italian-American from Cliff Springs camp, have enrolled to wage warfare for the Jack Dempsey trophy, and the Al Piche award that goes to the big fellow who hammers his way into possession of the heavyweight title in the Medford tourney. Each has asked to be used on Monday night's card with "Big" Jack Anderson, Joe Kamphos, or some other giant.

Although the seat sale does not open at Cleo's confectionery, Fir and Main streets, until Friday morning of this week, fans already are demanding tickets for the big fights. Despite bigness of the event, most popular prices, less than half charged for similar affairs in other parts of the country, will prevail when the sale gets under way.

GOLF PROS OPEN DRIVE FOR TITLE

BLUE MOUND COUNTRY CLUB, Milwaukee, Aug. 6.—(AP)—Under a setting of perfect weather and over one of the shortest campaign grounds in the tournament's history, 98 golfers opened the drive for the national professional championship at Blue Mound today.

The first starters, Len Mathew, St. Paul, and Ben Pautke, Detroit, banged long tee shots to open the drive for 31 qualifying positions in the 36-hole test.

Despite the great verbal barrage that preceded the tournament and threat of an open revolt against the professional golfers' association, a first class field was on the scene for the struggle to depose Olin Dutra, Los Angeles, as champion of American professional golf.

Boy Shreve: "I saw more fighting in an amateur show at Topeka, Kans., a few years ago than I had seen in years combined, and I'll be on hand supporting Medford's prizes Monday night at the Armory."

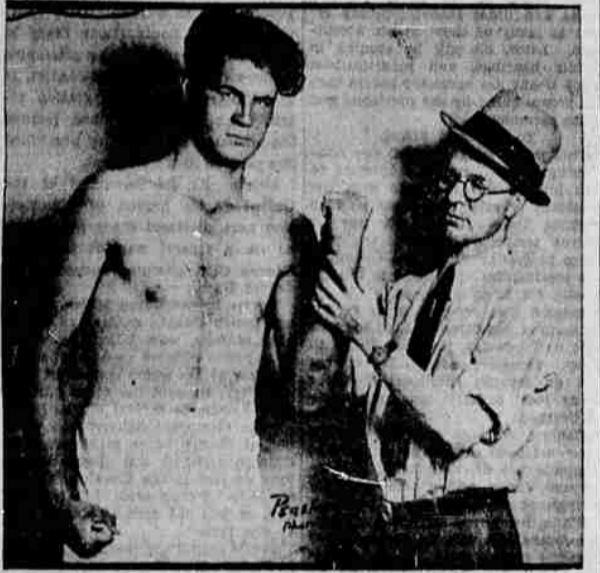
