GROWERS, GROCERS AGREE ON EARLY TOMATO HANDLING

Under the direction of Charles A. Wing, chairman of the Chamber of Commerce agricultural committee, a meeting of tomato growers and local grocers was held at the chamber of commerce last night with 11 growers and 5 grocers present.

It was estimated by the growers present that the crop of early tomatoes will approximate 80 tons and the combined crop of those who attended the meeting was 47 tons.

1. Tomatoes to be packed in 20-lb. crates either peach or tomato crates. 2. Tomatoes to be of uniform size and ripeness and to be faced.

3. Tomatoes to be free from split and rough fruit. 4. Crates to be loaded. 5. Stems to be removed. 6. Name of grower and actual net weight to be marked on crate.

A general discussion was entered into regarding marketing the crop and the price which will prevail to the grower and it was unanimously decided to leave this matter in the hands of a committee composed of Charles Bateman, Reliable Grocery; A. G. Anderson, Safeway Stores; G. O. Humphrey, Humphrey's Grocery, and Maynard Putney, Marsh's Grocery.

Mrs. Welch, Descendant Ironsides Skipper, to Be Honored Guest Aboard

A little gray-haired lady, wearing a gingham dress and apron, and very spry for her 82 years, laid her seeing eye to a large colored print in a wall frame.

The great-granddaughter of Captain Hull, originally in charge of America's greatest old war ship, had expressed to friends her desire to see the old ship which her famous ancestor had so nobly commanded.

In a telephone conversation this morning with Mr. Banwell, Walter H. May, manager of the Portland Chamber of Commerce, said that a delegation will meet the train tomorrow morning and that the descendant of the famous captain will be the honor guest of the Daughters of the

American Revolution and other civic and patriotic organizations during her stay in the north. Mr. Banwell said that Mrs. Welch's ticket has been donated by a prominent Medford citizen, and that she will board tomorrow evening's train for Portland.

Mrs. Welch, who came to Oregon in 1877 in an emigrant train, is the daughter of Isaac Hull, named after the Constitution captain. She married John B. Welch in Trenton, Mo., before coming west, and after remaining here for a short time, returned east for two years, then resumed her stay in Oregon.

For 13 years Mrs. Welch was post-mistress at Asbeaton, where her husband operated a sawmill about 28 miles from Medford in the Meadows district. Each little gesture in her conversation was emphasized by the wave of her scissors, which she had by her on the davenport where she was sewing.

Mrs. Welch resides on North Oakdale avenue with her daughter, Mrs. Nelle Prock. She has made her home in Medford since 1918. Tomorrow evening, Mrs. Welch will be taken to the Southern Pacific train by Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Cowgill, and will be introduced to a number of Medford people who will be making the trip to see the ship.
