## JACKSON CROPS ABOUT AVERAGE

Crop conditions as a whole, in Jackson county, are good, according to County Agent Robert G. Fowler.

Wheat yield, due to the "frenzy-out" last winter, is below normal, and will run about 25 bushels to the acre. Some averages will run as high as 30 bushels to the acre.

Other grain crops suffered from the "frenzy-out."

Sixty per cent of wheat crop has been threshed, according to County Agent Fowler.

Next week work will start on the wheat production control clause of the Farm Adjustment Act. This embodies the process tax. Further information thereon will be published later.

The third cutting of alfalfa is coming on fast. Hay production was average.

The corn crop is good, and average.
