EIGHTEEN ROAD JOB CONTRACTS TO BE AWARDED

Expenditure Of \$1,250,000 Will Be Authorized By Highway Commission At 2-Day Session Aug. 24-25

SALLEM, Aug. 11.—(P)—Eighteen highway jobs in 13 counties of the state and aggregating an expenditure of \$1,250,000 will be awarded at the two-day session of the state highway commission in Portland, August 24 and 25, it was announced here today with the issuance of calls for bids.

The contracts will cover a distance of 90 miles in addition to three bridge lettings and repair of roofs of the highway shops in Salem. The three counties of Lincoln, Tillamook and Polk, on the Salmon River and Coast highways will get one-third of this distance, although the cost would be less than several shorter projects, it was stated at the highway department.

Baker county, with two projects and a bridge job, will be apportioned about 15 miles, while Lane county with one project will have 14 miles. Klamath county gets three jobs totaling 10 miles; Grant county one project of 11 miles; Multnomah county a project of one and a half miles; Benton county two, totaling two miles, and Clatsop county one project of a mile and a third and two bridge lettings.

Humboldt Section Largest. The largest award to be let on August 24 is the grading of the North Fork-Humboldt Mountain section of the Wolf Creek route, a distance of 1.34 miles. The grading in this section will be heavy.

Heavy grading projects will be let in Baker and Klamath counties. All projects to be let the first day are federal jobs with the exception of resurfacing the highway shops at Salem, which will come out of state funds.

August 24 projects include: Baker county—Dixie line of Old Oregon Trail, grading and surfacing, 4.09 miles. This declared a heavy grading job.

Clatsop county—North Fork-Humboldt section of Wolf Creek route, 1.34 miles grading. Reconstruction of approaches to bridge over Youngs bay on the Oregon Coast highway near Astoria. This award was considered largest of bridge jobs to be let.

Klamath county—Terminal City-Klamath Falls section of the Dale-Columbia highway, one-fourth mile concrete paving. Also Odell Lake section of Willamette highway, 4.28 miles grading. The latter declared a heavy grading job.

Lane county—Doyle Hill-Nimrod section of McKenzie highway, 14.24 miles bituminous macadam wearing surface.

Sherman and Wasco counties—Biggs-John Day section and Dillon section of Columbia River highway, 11.19 miles bituminous macadam wearing surface.

Marion county—Resurfacing two buildings at state highway shops at Salem. This is a state award.

Benton county—Bummer Creek-Lobster Mountain section of secondary highway No. 201, four miles grading and 1.71 miles surfacing. This is a state project. (1.72.)

Multnomah county—Columbia Boulevard-S. P. & S. railroad undercrossing section of secondary highway No. 120, 1.44 miles of regrading and concrete paving. This will be a state project.

The following bids have been called for award on August 25:

Baker county—Durkee-Gales and Lime-Huntington sections of the Old Oregon Trail, 10.45 miles bituminous macadam wearing surface. Also one culvert and five bridges over Burnt river on the Dixie Line section of the Old Oregon Trail.

Grant county—Middle Fork-Flowena Gulch section of the Pendleton-John Day highway, 4.86 miles of grading. This was declared a heavy grading job.

Lincoln, Tillamook and Polk counties—Neakowin-Siletz River section of the Oregon Coast highway and Tillamook County-Grande Ronde section of the Salmon River highway, 27.44 miles bituminous macadam wearing surface.

Tillamook county—Mills Bridge-Deadman's section of the Willamette River highway, 2.4 miles grading and gravel topping.

Clatsop county—Bridge over Necanicum river on Wolf Creek highway near Necanicum.

The highway department announced that the new minimum wage schedule will be effective on all these jobs as designated several weeks ago, paying not less than 55 cents an hour for common labor and 65 cents an hour for skilled labor. On certain isolated section a 40-hour week may be used instead of the 30-hour as provided under other federal jobs.

Employment will be given men recommended by local employment agencies specified by the U. S. employment bureau, it was announced. Domestic materials will be used, or if foreign materials are to be used, alternate bids will be requested. Subcontracts may be let on some jobs not to exceed 20 per cent of the contract.

WIVES IN BATTLE OVER REMAINS OF FLIER, ADVENTURER

Movie Actress Claims She Married Deeds in China—Harsh Words Exchanged in Kansas City Station.

KANSAS CITY, Aug. 11.—(AP)—Words were many and tears were few today at the second meeting of two women, each of whom insists she is the lawful widow of Captain Ed P. M. Deeds, American aviator killed in China, whose body ended its long journey home this morning.

Mrs. Marie Hennesey Shirley Deeds, an actress, who accompanied the body from China, stepped from the train to encounter the blond Mrs. Betty Deeds, who flew to Kansas City yesterday from Los Angeles.

Strange Reception. The meeting provided a strange reception for the body of the world war flier and soldier of fortune, who shot down eight enemy planes as a youthful member of the Royal Flying corps.

The surviving rivals of this post-

humous triangle immediately asserted their claims to widowhood in connection with the flier's death, thus resuming a debate begun a week ago when arrival of the aviator's body in San Francisco brought them face to face for the first time.

Mrs. Betty Deeds, first wife of the aviator, was flanked about at Union station this morning by a large group of friends of Captain Deeds, who had known her as the true spouse of the aviator. She expressed determination to possess herself of her husband's body.

Would Bar Second Wife. The aviator's second wife, Mrs. Marie Deeds, placed her arms about the dead flier's mother, Mrs. Millie Polvin, as the group moved through the station. The flier's mother became hysterical.

"Get away. Don't touch me," she shouted. "I don't even know you." As her relatives sought to comfort her, she cried, "All of you leave me alone. Oh, that woman. Why should my son be dragged down this way?"

Pair Near Blows. At the head of the stairway, up which the party climbed, the two rivals met again. With hands extended they approached each other glaring, but friends quickly intervened.

"She can't go to the funeral tomorrow," the first wife of the flier said. "I can't stand to see her there. I won't let her go."

"You bet your life I'm going to the funeral," shouted the second wife across the wide corridor of Union station.

"It's just another case of a discarded wife trying to get back in the swim after divorcing her husband and then trying to get the money he left," she explained as she left the station.

The second wife asserted she had proof Deeds and his first wife were divorced in Mexico. She said to "make it even more sure," Deeds obtained a second divorce in China.
