DEMOS LINE UP FOR PASSING OF POLITICAL PLUMS

William Grenbrenner of Ashland, member of the American Legion and associated with a granite company of that city, has received endorsements from southern Oregon Democrats for the position of postmaster in the Litchia City. The term of Fred Wagner expires early next year.

William R. Bement of Ashland is endorsed for the deputy United States marshalship for the southern Oregon district, now held by Cal C. Wells. According to local Democrats, the aspirant with the most endorsements has the inside track, plus the number of influential citizens who have contributed their John Hancock for democracy and Democrats.

Medford Bourbons with an appetite for patronage plums under the New Deal are also getting lined up with signatures and influence.

Attorney E. C. Kelly, member from this county in the legislature, is aimed at an attorneyship for the Home Loan bank, which started operations this week in Portland.
