

### EAGLE'S TALONS SHARP FOR NRA CODE VIOLATORS

#### Penalty Provisions of Law to Be Used Fully When Necessary Says Administrator—Drive Moves Fast

WASHINGTON, Aug. 18. — (AP) — Hugh S. Johnson, national recovery chief, said today the penalty provisions of the law were intended only for "recalcitrant minorities," but that they would be used fully when necessary.

At the same time, the administrator told newspapermen that the "influx of codes and the exhaustion of N. R. A. insignia makes it look as though the Blue Eagle campaign is going over even more rapidly than I expected."

Country Covered. Shortly before opening the hearing on an automobile code, Johnson had described the re-employment campaign as "drawing to a close," adding that it has "covered the country from one end to the other with Blue Eagles."

Discussing the penalties in the recovery act, the administrator repeated that it was intended that under the code, industry should govern itself.

He said he expected the bulk of every industry to move together "in this great cooperating effort," but whenever it was necessary to use the penalties provision, including licensing of industries and fines or jail sentences, it would be done.

Hint to Ford. Johnson opened hearings on the automobile manufacturing code with a statement apparently directed at least in part at Henry Ford, that no exceptions would be made in its administration, whether the manufacturers not concurring are small or large.

Without mentioning Ford by name, but with his meaning pointed by Ford's declination thus far to sub-

scribe to the code presented by others of the industry, Johnson said: "It is a matter of regret that the industry as represented here does not include 100 per cent of automobile manufacturers; because, certain it is, that in the administration of this law and the distribution of Blue Eagles, no exception can be made in favor of any manufacturer, whether his output be great or small.

"We shall execute this law as we find it, without fear and without favor."

Open Shop Stickler. In addition to the absence of Ford from the list of manufacturers supporting the code, interest in the hearing centered upon its labor provisions declaring in favor of the open shop.

The code provides wages of 40 to 43 cents per hour for factory workers, depending upon the population of the city in which they work. Maximum hours are stipulated as 48 in any one week, with the average not to exceed 35.

After setting forth that employees shall have the right to organize and bargain collectively through representatives chosen by themselves, without interference or coercion, the code says: "Under the foregoing provisions, the employers in the industry may continue the open shop policy under which the selection, retention and advancement of employees will be on the basis of individual merit without regard to their affiliation or non-affiliation with any labor or other organization."

Donald Richberg, counsel to the recovery administration, urged the elimination of the "open shop" reference from the code, saying it "may be easily construed as the declaration of a policy of refusing to comply with the law."

### LOCAL BUSINESS TO BE CHECKED FOR NRA USAGE

The executive committee of the Medford organization of the National Recovery Act is steadily receiving additional information regarding the rulings and regulations of the act, worked out at national headquarters, and the members announced today that the big check on all local businesses to determine compliance with the act will be started within a few days.

A complete checkup of every business in the Medford area will be made, showing in each case whether or not the particular business is living up to the requirements of the code with a 100 per cent observance.

After this information is compiled the N. R. A. eagle will be permitted to remain, only at those businesses that have signed their respective codes and observed them to the letter.

The local organization of the National Recovery Act has been perfected with establishment of the information bureau, which started in operation yesterday morning at the Chamber of Commerce building. The committee, composed of Leon B. Harkin, Harry Fredette and Dr. C. H. Panko, will be at the Chamber of Commerce each morning from 9:00 to 10:00 o'clock for the purpose of receiving complaints and disseminating information regarding the proper operation of the N. R. A. codes in relation to business and working hours and wages.

### NEW ANGLE SEEN IN DISAPPEARANCE UTILITY EMPLOYEE

PORTLAND, Aug. 18.—(AP)—Police today redoubled their efforts to find Arthur B. Blanchard, 45, missing employee of the Mountain States Power company at Albany, when they were told by an automobile renting agency here that Blanchard rented a machine Saturday night and that it has not been returned.

Blanchard left his wife here Saturday evening, telling her he had an engagement with a stamp collector. The automobile company said that not more than 15 minutes later he rented the car, saying he would need it three hours. His wife said he told her when he left that he would return within an hour.

Early this week Blanchard's package of stamps and airmail envelopes were received in the mail, addressed to him at Albany. A note accompanied them, signed by R. G. Pack, who said they were recovered near the Oceanic Steamship terminal here. They had been in the water. Blanchard's name and address was in the package.

Harbor police dragged the river at the point where the package was found, and this work was continued today.

Employees of the automobile renting agency said Blanchard appeared in a despondent mood when he took the machine. Friends said he had been ill several months. A warrant for his arrest was obtained by the renting agency when the machine was not returned as promised.

Mr. Richardson said he was "very hopeful that a reorganization plan can be effected which will put the association in new management and put it under control of those who have invested money in it."

Malla said during the reorganization and conservatorship, payments on installment stock will be accepted by the examiner in charge for deposit in a trust fund. The payments either will be applied on the stock under the reorganization plan or returned to the holders of installment or savings stock.

The commissioner declared the action "is for the protection of all interested persons and eliminates any danger from litigation or undue advantage from anyone having accounts with the association."

The examination of the company was reported at the conference to have disclosed "a depreciation in value of company holdings in a sufficient amount to counterbalance the company's present surplus and to seriously impair the fully paid permanent reserve stock."

### Ready Loans Only Assets.

Loans in real estate comprise all of the company's \$25,000,000 in assets. These are divided approximately as follows: \$20,000,000 in California; \$2,000,000 in Oregon; \$500,000 in Washington; \$50,000 in Montana; \$1,000,000 in Idaho; \$500,000 in Utah; and \$500,000 in stock loans or loans obtained by investors on their share holdings. Cash on hand, holdings in government bonds and loans on real estate in Wyoming and Arizona make up the balance of the assets.

Liabilities to investors consist generally of investment holdings by investors in installment and savings stock, permanent reserve stock of \$1,450,000, surplus of approximately \$300,000 and other items. Total liability on installment and savings accounts are approximately \$24,000,000, divided approximately \$5,000,000 in accounts of California investors; \$6,000,000 by Montana investors; \$4,500,000 by Utah investors; \$3,000,000 by Idaho investors; \$1,500,000 by Wyoming investors; \$400,000 by Nevada investors, and \$4,000,000 in Washington and Oregon.
