

Papers of State Divided On Calling Legislature For Creation Sales Tax

Publishers Are Polled as Governor Calls For Opinions in Emergency No Alternative Given

(By the Associated Press)

A division of opinion as to the propriety of a special sales tax to insure a fund through which Oregon could match federal money to provide relief for an estimated 120,000 unemployed persons this fall and winter, was evident among daily newspapers of the state today.

At a meeting in Portland Tuesday in which Governor Julius L. Meier called in legislative leaders, tax authorities, heads of relief organizations and chairmen of civic organizations, the special sales tax appeared to be the only plan through which the money, admittedly necessary, could be raised. The governor said he would sound out public opinion through the press and other channels before making his recommendations for a special session.

Press Polled

The Associated Press undertook a survey of Oregon's daily newspapers to learn the viewpoint of the press at this preliminary stage of the discussion.

The MORNING OREGONIAN endorsed the special sales tax as the only reasonable source of revenue.

The CAPITAL JOURNAL at Salem announced it would support the plan and the Oregon Statesman of that city stated editorially today that it will not oppose the special sales tax, although it believes the suggestion will be futile. That paper believes Governor Meier should have called known antagonists of the sales tax to attend the meeting Tuesday.

Public Opposed

The LA GRANDE OBSERVER stated that "The recent election proved the public is overwhelmingly opposed to the sales tax, and any attempt to foster the same tax through forced legislation should be opposed to the last letter. A special session, however, could do much, if it would, to right the laxities of the last session, and there must be some adequate regulation of the liquor situation."

The BAKER DEMOCRAT-HERALD is of much the same opinion, although endorsing a special session to deal with unemployment relief, liquor control and any other subjects that demand immediate attention.

"We will not support a plan for levying a sales tax," this daily said, "because the people have just said by an overwhelming majority that they do not want a sales tax and we think their views should be respected inasmuch as it is their government. We did not oppose a sales tax at the July election, and we would not oppose it now but for the manifest determination of the people not to accept it. Its enactment by the legislature would in all probability be followed by a referendum which would plunge the state's financial affairs into further chaos."

On the other hand, the DAILY

CHRONICLE at The Dalles announced that it endorsed the proposed sales tax, and will support such a proposition.

The KLAMATH FALLS EVENING HERALD and the MORNING NEWS there announced both "probably would be generally favorable to a sales tax for unemployment relief, but would recommend that all other plans be studied and presented to the public before any single plan is seriously advanced, inasmuch as the sales tax idea was once defeated." Both papers approved the general sales tax for property tax relief at the special election.

The MEDFORD MAIL TRIBUNE favors calling a special session of the legislature to provide funds for unemployment relief and for the regulation of liquor, in anticipation of repeal of the 18th amendment. It believes, also, that "opponents of the sales tax should present their alternative to the sales tax in detail before the session is called, or admit they have no plan."

At Roseburg, the NEWS REVIEW feels that, in view of the overwhelming disapproval of the general sales tax at the last election, "such a measure should be a last resort in raising funds to relieve unemployment." The paper said it would approve the sales tax "only if and when it is found that no other plan can be successfully carried out."

The COURIER at Grants Pass opposed what is described as a "political 'bull-dog' for a special legislative session and a state sales tax, and called on the Josephine county delegation to institute and support a 'county first' drive."

The EUGENE REGISTER-GUARD says: "If we adopt a defeatist attitude we might as well quit now. The political dangers of a special session are ever present. The dangers of continued drifting are greater. Every property owner and ever parent of school children knows the present crisis in state and local finances is a real one. The suggested sales tax may not be the answer but an answer can be found and the people will not tolerate a session that plays horse."

TRUCK AND BUS DECISION MADE MORE SPECIFIC

SALEM, Aug. 24.—(P)—A formal decree elaborating his memorandum opinion of last week, holding invalid certain sections of the truck and bus law, was handed down late yesterday by Judge L. G. Lewelling.

The circuit judge held unconstitutional the placing of contract and private haulers under the jurisdiction of the commissioner of public utility

and nullified the authority of that official to fix rates, prescribe forms and accounting, issue permits, require surety bonds, require periodical reports on demand, prescribe safety precautions, promulgate traffic rules to relieve congestion, require triplicate receipts for certain shipments, prescribe class distinguishing emblems, conduct hearings for new contract carrier applicants, and to require copies of contracts on demand.

He did not declare invalid the provisions of the law respecting fees to be paid for use of the highways; but the invalidation of the enforcing machinery is deemed to leave the fee provision of doubtful force, in the opinion of observers here.

Utilities Commissioner G. M. Thomas announced his department would enforce the law in compliance with the decree of the court; but that
