HIGHWAY SAFETY TO BE STRESSED IN COMING MONTH

In keeping with the motives of the country-wide street and highway safety movement to be made in September, Mayor E. M. Wilson issued a statement today, urging drivers and pedestrians alike in this city to set examples of conduct in the use of streets and highway. Not only for themselves, is the special cooperation urged, but for the safety of other. Mayor Wilson also asks that special attention be given by officials of the city to the enforcement of laws and ordinances designed for the protection of all.

In connection with the statement the following facts were brought to attention of the local public today: Last year throughout the United States, 39,000 persons were killed and more than 900,000 were injured in automobile accidents which occurred in practically every community in our country. Since it is common knowledge that this record of casualties is largely due to the misuse of the streets and highways by too many drivers and pedestrians, the month of September has been set aside by many states as a period in which to demonstrate just how many lives and limbs may be saved by the exercise of more care and consideration on the part of drivers and pedestrians.

No day passes without many drivers hurrying through intersections, passing other cars improperly, driving at too rapid a speed, or falling in other respects to use the streets and highways in a safe manner. No day passes without many pedestrians crossing in the middle of the block, darting out into the streets from behind parked vehicles, crossing intersections against signal lights, and in other ways using the streets and highways improperly.

The consequence of such acts are the deaths and the non-fatal injuries which occur in our midst and in every town and city in the United States. The improper practices occur at such a frequency that it is impossible for the police or other authorities to even begin to cope with the situation, inasmuch as it is apparent that a greater degree of safety in the use of our streets and highways can only be realized as people, of their own free will, cooperate among themselves to that end.

LEGION LEADER APPROVES PLAN FOR CONVENTION

CHICAGO, Aug. 24.—Louis Johnson, national commander of the American Legion, following an inspection trip all day with officials of the American Legion Thirty-Three corporation, has approved all the work done in planning for the 15th annual national convention to be held here October 2-5. The corporation was organized to carry on convention activities and preparations.

The national commander told a press conference the attendance should be a quarter of a million members and guests of the Legion and Legion Auxiliary, and possibly more if economic conditions continue to improve.

He was informed that more than 2000 volunteer workers are required to handle the details that arise in connection with the big convention. He visited Soldiers' Field and the Chicago Stadium in determining the line of march for the parade, being accompanied by a group of Legion officials, including the Illinois department commander, James P. Ringler,

and the general manager and vice-president of the Thirty-Three corporation, Phil Collins.

The national commander decided the parade will form north of the Chicago river and east and west of Michigan avenue, at the corner of Ohio street and Michigan. The line of march will be two and one-half miles down Michigan boulevard to Soldiers' Field, which has a seating capacity of approximately 150,000 and the finest reviewing stands in the world. It is estimated that 11 to 12 hours will be required for the parade. Interspersed will be 800 drum and bugle corps and more than 100 bands.

The business sessions of the convention will be held in the Chicago Stadium, the \$7,000,000 amphitheatre in which the two great political parties nominated candidates for president last year. Methods for seating and handling the crowds, in keeping with the tried and proven plans for the political conventions, were approved.

AL SMITH SUPPORTS RECOVERY PROGRAM

NEW YORK, Aug. 24.—(AP)—Alfred E. Smith is in favor of full co-operation by the country in President Roosevelt's NRA program. He said in a speech last night that if the plan cannot, in the nature of things, accomplish the millennium, "it has unquestionably resulted to date in the increasing of wages in many callings and in the employment of a large

number of those who had become, or were about to become, through no fault of their own, public charges."

PUBLISHER'S BODY FOUND IN STREAM

COSHOCOTON, O., Aug. 24.—(AP)—Bound and weighted down with a hammer, a plow-point and lead slugs, the body of Fred S. Wallace, 61-year-old missing newspaper publisher, was found in Muskingum river two miles from here last night.

Dr. F. W. Craig, county coroner, withheld his verdict, while Prosecutor Russell E. Lyons began a study of the publisher's disappearance three days ago.
