TEN YEARS AGO TODAY
August 25, 1923.
(It was Saturday.)

THE NRA, of course, isn't socialism,—at least not in the Marxian sense. Neither is it Russian communism, or any other "ism."

THE old planless system has tragically failed. So a planned system is to be tried, and the government is determined to do everything in its power to make it succeed.

Under the New Deal, no business, large or small, will hereafter be allowed to go its own sweet way, as it wishes, regardless of consequences to its competitors or the country at large.

That's the idea behind the New Deal. It ISN'T socialism. It ISN'T communism. It is in fact a typically American program, which if successful, will steer this country safely away from the rocks of such destructive radicalism for many generations to come.

Don't Rock the Boat
SUCH a revolutionary program can't be instituted without considerable confusion and misunderstanding. Many people are going to get the wrong idea and jump to conclusions which are not justified.

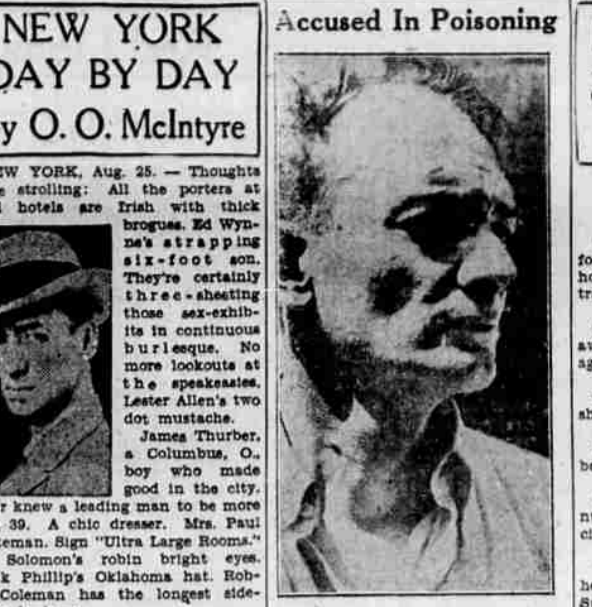
