

# GRANTS PASS TO MEET MEDFORD HERE ON SUNDAY

### Athletes Coming With Idea of Teaching Locals Bit of Baseball — Both Teams Impressive in Statistics

Word that Cliff McLean, Medford pitcher, will not join the San Francisco Seals until next spring was received today. It was Cliff's desire to participate in college athletics this fall and winter. Joining the Seals now would professionalize him and cause him to be barred from future college competition. Manager Hal Haight of the Medford Rogues immediately made arrangements to retain his services for the balance of the season.

The Grants Pass athletes will invade Medford Sunday afternoon and attempt to show the Rogues how baseball should be played. The boys from the Pass have held the upper hand at baseball in southern Oregon for the past two years. In fact, their team last year claimed the championship of Oregon, with a very impressive record of 21 wins and four defeats. Their team this year is just as strong as it was last, but whether they are strong enough to combat the much improved Medford team of this year remains to be seen.

Comparison of strength of the two teams places them on an even basis, both having broken even in a series with Coquille, the Rogues winning 13 to 6, and losing 4 to 1, while the Grants Pass team won 5 to 4 and lost 8 to 2. No other reliable basis of comparison is available.

McLean, star Indian pitcher, will be on the mound for Medford, opposing Jack Hughes for Grants Pass. Until the rise of McLean here, Jack was rated the best moundman in southern Oregon. The game should be a real pitchers' battle with two such stellar performers, and a real treat for the fans.

Monday will be another baseball day for Medford. The House of David colored team and the Rogues will meet at the fairgrounds in an evening game starting at 5:30 p. m. The invaders boast a pepper game that is worth the price of admission alone, and features Chappie Grey, the headless clown. The side attractions are better than a minstrel show. The players have beards and long hair, which will be quite a novelty, besides having players on the team of major league caliber. The affair should be mighty interesting from a fan standpoint.

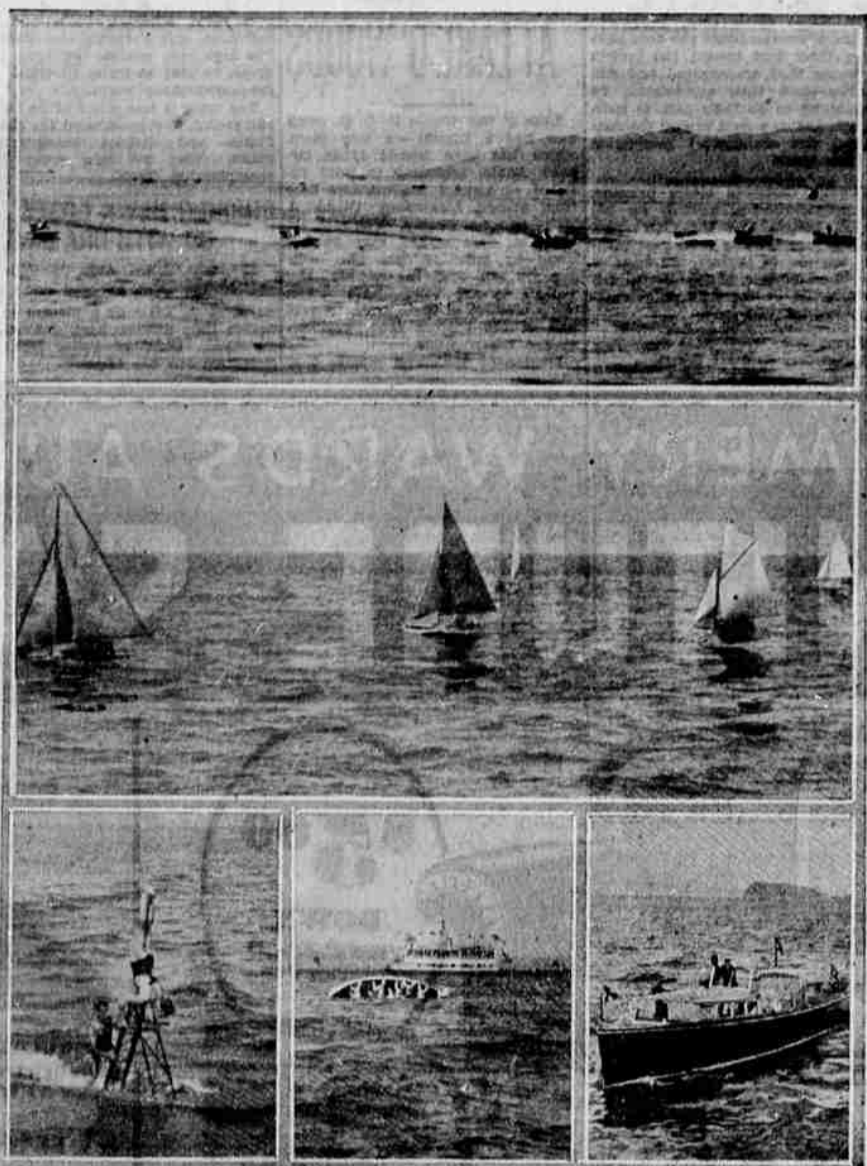

# ROSEBURG ADDED TO LILLARD LIST AS MATCHMAKER

Mack Lillard, Medford boxing and wrestling promoter, has signed a two-year contract to act in the same capacity for the Roseburg boxing commission, he announced yesterday. Lillard, who has also been promoting ring events for some time in Klamath Falls, will thus be able to use a higher grade of talent than heretofore, by signing up wrestlers and boxers for appearance in the three-town circuit.

Wrestlers of high repute are willing to come to towns the size of Medford, Klamath and Roseburg, when assured they can squeeze in two or three matches in a trip covering only a week. On the other hand a long journey to Medford on a one-night stand for the necessarily small purse has no attraction to men who are capable of pulling down several hundred dollars for each performance in the cities.

Lillard reports he is being importuned to take charge of the promotional end of the game in Marshfield and may also add that city to his circuit.

Because of Wong Bock Cheung's departure in a few days for the Hawaiian Islands, Lillard will not be able to bring the Chinese grappler here for a match as many fans had hoped.
