

# ENRIGHT REQUESTS \$25 FOR DEFENSE OF C. JEAN CONNER

A bill for \$25 for the defense of C. Jean Conner, "the bright boy of Pidehast," and one of the leading minor figures in the Banks-Pehl agitation, was filed yesterday by Attorney T. J. Enright, with the county court. Conner who entered a plea of guilty to ballot-theft, was sentenced to a three year term and paroled. No action was taken on the bill. It was one of many presented in the end-of-the-month rush.

Conner during the ballot-theft trials appeared as a defense witness, and was paroled to Attorney H. von Schmalz of Burns, at von Schmalz's suggestion. Conner is reported to be working on the livestock ranch of the Pacific Livestock Co., located 180 miles from Burns, and 150 miles from Winnemucca, Nev., in the wide open spaces of Harney county. The conditions of the parole imposed by the court require Conner to remain out of Jackson county for one year, and to refrain from oratorical efforts. He was vice-president of the self-styled "Good Government congress," its parliamentarian and most spontaneous talker, and a member of the "Banks guards."

Members of the county court said they would take no action on the Conner defense account, until "we find out where we are at."

Conner when appearing for sentence, requested that Attorney Enright, and Attorney von Schmalz be appointed by the court, to be his counsel, and both made pleas in his behalf. In the course of his plea, Attorney von Schmalz agreed to take Conner to Harney county and secure a job for him. The court accepted the proffer. The county court desires to confer with Assistant Attorney General Moody on the bill.

Pending sentence Conner was at liberty on \$7500 bonds furnished by his parents.

# REDUCE AIRMAIL FOR ECONOMIES

WASHINGTON, Aug. 31.—(AP)—Orders were issued today by Postmaster General Farley suspending airmail service on four routes September 5, until further notice and discontinuing certain trips of three other services on the same date. The orders resulted from economy measures requiring saving of \$7,000,000 in airmail appropriations.

Services suspended were: Los Angeles-San Diego; Pueblo-Amarillo, Albuquerque-El Paso and New York-Atlantic City.

Services discontinued Dayton Beach-St. Petersburg 2:50 p. m. trip from Dayton Beach and 10:15 a. m. trip from St. Petersburg; St. Louis-Kansas City 4:10 p. m. trip from St. Louis and 8:45 a. m. trip from Kansas City; Kansas City-Wichita 12:30 p. m. trip from Kansas City and 4:30 p. m. trip from Wichita.

# SAVE BOY SCOUTS FROM CLIFF FACE

PLATTSBURGH, N. Y., Aug. 31.—(AP)—Three Boy Scouts who clung for their lives to a tiny ledge 400 feet up on the rocky side of Wallace mountain today were back home, saved from death after two days of privation and peril.

The Scouts—Robert Glenn, Tyler Grey and William LaDue—were nearing exhaustion and a probable fatal plunge down the perpendicular cliff into a gorge when rescuers, in a thrilling feat of mountaineering, hauled them to safety at the end of a 225-foot rope late yesterday.

Lifted to a higher ledge, they were brought down along a wild Adirondack trail. Today they were recovering at their Plattsburgh homes from the effects of hunger and exposure of freezing winds.

Colonel Alenderfer and Major J. C. Thompson, working under General Ben E. Harder, are today furthering the check in the Prospect, Butte Falls, and out-of-town districts in the county, in an effort to make Jackson county one hundred per cent NRA.

Agricultural interests in the area have expressed confusion as to the effect of the NRA drive upon them, and the executive committee this morning stressed the point that the agriculturists do not come under this checking.

The six captains in charge of the drive, which is progressing smoothly are Leonard Carpenter, O. M. Kidd, Harry Hansen, Victor Tengwald, A. C. Hubbard and E. G. Jerome.

A booth was opened this morning in the chamber of commerce, in charge of women volunteers, where persons may obtain the consumers' stickers to be placed in the window of their homes. These are given persons who sign the consumer's card. At the close of the campaign throughout the district, a check will be made of the residential sections urging all consumers to patronize only the stores in which the eagles flies.
