

Southern Oregon Golfers Open Battle for Title Here Tomorrow

QUALIFYING PLAY WILL FIND LINKS IN TOP CONDITION

Women Tee Off 9 A. M. in Preliminary — Men Qualify in Afternoon — Good Scores Seen in Practice

Local and out-of-town golfers who have been tuning up their swings for the southern Oregon championship tourney which opens the qualifying stage here tomorrow, report the Rogue Valley course in splendid condition for play.

H. D. Bentley, local star, turned in a 57 in a practice round yesterday and is expected to give some of the visiting stars a run for their money.

Other tourney entrants who have shown in warm-up play are Ed Milligan of Eugene and W. R. Crum of Joplin, Mo., the latter hailing from Horton Smith's home town.

The southern Oregon women's tournament, which will be played concurrently with the men's tourney, will get under way tomorrow morning, qualifying rounds starting at 9 o'clock.

NELSON REPEATS IN ONTARIO SWIM

TORONTO, Ont., Aug. 31.—(AP)—Winning Canada's annual 15-mile swim in Lake Ontario was getting to be a habit today with Marvin Nelson, brawny distance champion from Port Dodge, Iowa.

He won the event for the second time yesterday, becoming the first man in the history of the grind to repeat. And in the bargain he clipped more than 19 minutes from the course record by plowing the distance in seven hours, 37 2/3 seconds.

It was not much of a test for the mid-westerner who won first in 1930 and placed fourth last year, when George Blagden, Memphis lawyer, won in the record time of 7:19:32.

Baseball's deep and abiding passion—a truly "crucial" series—gripped Boston and the National league today as Bill Terry's New York Giants ran their pennant chances into the gauntlet of the second place Braves.

The Giants brought a full six-game lead to Braves field, normally a discouraging outlook for the home folks, but it's been many a long and stormy season since any Boston club could thrill the faithful with a threat even that close.

They play six games in four days, and therein lies Boston's stoutest hope. Terry's amazing pitching staff has been worked overtime beating off the Cubs, Pirates, and Cardinals for the past two weeks, with the seams spreading further each day.

Bill McKeechies advantage, if there is any, lies in the fact that his strongest pitchers are rested and ready. He has Ben Cantwell, the league's leading hurler, for the single game today with Bud Parmelee, batted out of the box by the Cardinals Monday, his probable opposition. For two games tomorrow, the single game Saturday, and the final pair Sunday, he can rotate Lefty Ed Brandt, the veteran Tom Zachary, Fred Frank-

house, Huck Betts and probably Cantwell again in the second game of the final doubleheader.

Only Carl Hubbell, the brilliant soup-paw, and Freddie Fitzsimmons, the fat right hander, have maintained their top pitching form for Terry in the bruising series just closed with the Cubs.

Setting the scene for the start of today's big battle the Giants out-belted the Cards 5 to 4 yesterday with Hal Schumacher showing signs of wear and Jap as he staggered home victorious in a duel with Dizzy Dean. Meanwhile the Braves, regaining their stride, knocked down the Reds 3 to 2 to even the series as Huck Betts turned in a neat five-hit performance.

While the boys have been guessing him into the management of either the White Sox or the Red Sox next season, Ruth knows nothing about it. "That's up to several other people besides myself," he said. "I'm still the property of the Yankees. If another club wanted me for manager, they would have to make some sort of a deal with Col. Ruppert. It's up to the owners of the other clubs. I haven't been approached, even unofficially, by anyone."
