PORTLAND BANK CLEARINGS GROW

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 1.—(AP)—Portland bank clearings for August topped all previous monthly figures for 1933, the Federal Reserve bank here reported today, with recorded clearings of \$78,792,949. This was \$10,617,830 more than the clearings for August, 1932, and \$1,300,000 above last month's total.

Building permits in Portland for August exceeded the total for last August by about \$67,245.

Foreign exports from this city in August were slightly in excess of the July movement. The total value in August was \$332,014, and in July \$323,118. A year ago the total was \$1,203,945.

PROVISIONAL ARREST FOR OUT-STATE CARS

SALEM, Sept. 1.—(AP)—"Provisional arrest" tags have been given approximately 40 out-of-state car owners who are working in Oregon but have not secured Oregon licenses for their automobiles, as required by the last legislature, state police reported.

If an Oregon license is purchased within a specified time the case is dropped. Several motorists who failed to secure licenses after receiving tags were brought into court, fined and forced to buy licenses. A close check of the hop yards is being made.

PLAN REORGANIZING OF LOAN ASSOCIATION

SALEM, Sept. 1.—(AP)—Reorganization of the Western Loan and Building company of Salt Lake City, is being planned for the association which was recently taken over by the banking department of Utah, Charles H. Carey, corporation commissioner, was informed here today.

Information from J. A. Mallis, Utah bank commissioner, stated plans for reorganization were talked by the self-appointed committee of investors and representatives of eight western states in which the company operated. The plan favored would call for a permanent reserve stock organization, the capital to come from investors.

NORFOLK, Neb., Sept. 1.—(AP)—Joseph Worley, 46, Longview, Wash., who had been in Norfolk three weeks visiting relatives, shot and killed his wife Isabel, 46, and then fired a bullet into his own brain today in Mapes park here. He is not expected to live.
