

### FREE WOOD CURB IS INAUGURATED BY COUNTY COURT

The county court has taken action to curtail the procuring of free wood at the city woodyard by the able-bodied and those able to buy wood, on the ground that the privilege was abused last winter.

If a woodyard is maintained, it will only be for supplying fuel to the aged, the crippled and extreme cases of need, the county court voted yesterday.

The county furnished the trucks and the gasoline for hauling the logs to the woodyard last winter, and the wood was given in exchange for cutting it.

Records of the Jackson county relief committee show that 1136 residents of the county last winter received supplies from the county commissary who were not entitled to it, and they have been stricken from the list.

At the present time but 121 persons are on the relief list. They are old folks or people sick or crippled.

No relief is extended to the able-bodied, under a recent ruling of the relief committee, but every possible assistance is given in procuring work for the deserving, and 249 have been assigned to jobs in the past 10 days.

The relief committee has a complete record of applicants for aid, and it is card-indexed. By means of this system, relief will be placed on a systematic basis in the future, and the worthy poor will receive the consideration due them, and which they did not receive last winter.

### HOARDER DEADLINE SET FOR SEPT. 18TH

WASHINGTON, Sept. 1.—(UP)—The treasury department last night extended until September 18 the deadline when persons in possession of gold coin, bullion or certificates must report their holdings to the government under President Roosevelt's latest anti-gold hoarding order.

The previous deadline was Sept. 12. Special additional extensions up to October 12 are authorized. Forms for making returns will be available at the treasury, federal reserve banks and offices of internal revenue collection.

### Youth Bound Over On Theft Charge

Earl Thompson, 19, charged with stealing a number of articles from the offices of Dr. B. C. Wilson and Attorney Harry Skyrman in the Medford center building, appeared before Justice of the Peace W. R. Coleman Thursday afternoon and was bound over to the grand jury. Bail was set at \$1500. Thompson is being held in the county jail.

Water System Debt Free. MONMOUTH, Sept. 1.—(AP)—Final payment has been made on the Monmouth water system. Payment of the \$25,000 bonded indebtedness extended over a 21-year period.

### \$1659 COST BILL FOR JONES TRIAL ASKED BY COUNTY

A cost bill amounting to \$1,659.05 has been filed by the district attorney's office against Walter J. Jones, former mayor of Rogue River, now serving a four year sentence in state prison for ballot theft.

A portion of the total is for witnesses subpoenaed by the defense but not called to the witness stand. The major portion, however, is for meals, rooms, and mileage for jurors.

Attorneys for Jones have filed objections to the cost bill, on the grounds that it was not filed within the time prescribed by law, and other technical reasons.

Under the state law, the state can, in convictions, assess the cost of the trial to the defendants, and the costs are docketed as judgments, and enforceable as liens.

Similar action has been taken against Earl H. Pehl and Gordon L. Schermerhorn, former county officials found guilty of ballot box conspiracy, J. Arthur LaDieu, another convicted defendant, and L. A. Banks, former local agitator, serving a life sentence for murder.

Schermerhorn, through his attorney, has filed an objection to his cost bill, holding that it is approximately \$1500 too high. Banks also filed objections.

Defense counsel holds that the state has no right to claim costs for boarding of jurors, or to claim mileage and witness fees for co-defendants.

Hearing on the cost bills will be heard as soon as possible before Judge George F. Skipworth & Eugene.
