

JAP APOSTLE OF NEW RELIGION IS CHICAGO VISITOR

Six Million Call Him Holy in Japan—Beliefs Resemble Christian Science—Was Founded by Woman

CHICAGO, Sept. 1.—(UP)—A chubby, moon faced Japanese whose person is regarded as divine by nearly 6,000,000 people last night brought to Chicago news of a religion which is growing so fast special trains are being run and new tram lines built to care for its followers.
Word of the new faith, less than 100 years old, was given by Shozon Nakayama, patriarch of Tenrikyo, Japan's most flourishing religious belief.

Like Christian Science Nakayama, only 28 years old and looking even younger, as he peered from behind horn rimmed spectacles, has been active head of the church for eight years. Beliefs of Tenrikyo have been compared to those of Christian Science and its founder, like that of Christian Science, was a woman who believed faith could rid man of illness and disease.

Under the direction of the young patriarch, great-grandson of Tenrikyo's founder, the religion is gathering thousands of converts a year. It has grown 500 percent in twenty-five years. Its members number nearly 6,000,000 belonging to 10,500 churches.

"The aim of Tenrikyo," said Nakayama, "is establishment of peace and happiness in this world through the religious ideals which were taught by its foundress."

Doctrines Only Concern The church has little concern in matters outside its doctrines, he said. It is growing so fast that little or no attention has been paid to causes of international interest or local moral issues. As yet, these matters have been left to individual members.

"We teach the faith and only ask that people act in all matters in accord with the beliefs of the church," said the patriarch. The religion, he pointed out, had spread rapidly over Japan until now it is 20 times larger than any other sect of the Shinto religion from which it derives.

Its campaigns are carried on with all the resources of modern life. A huge missionary college has been built and hundreds of missionaries are sent out each year into Korea, remote parts of Japan, Manchuria, China, Indo-China and the Philippines. There are a score of churches in Japanese communities in the United States.

Growing Rapidly So heavy have pilgrimages been to the shrine of Mikinokayama, the founder, that a special tram line has been built to accommodate the traffic. Special trains are run on festival days from all parts of Japan. A special department is in charge of motion picture propaganda, distribution of documents and printed matter.

The foundress of the religion was a simple peasant woman who claimed a divine revelation at the age of 41. The cult spread slowly during her life but after her death at the age of 90, disciples gained increasing numbers of converts. The leadership of Tenrikyo is handed down in accord with the rules of primogeniture.

MORE GIRLS SEEKING COLLEGE ENTRY FOR COMING YEAR SHOWN

CORVALLIS, Ore.—(Sp)—A larger proportion of women and a smaller proportion of out-of-state students in the freshmen class at Oregon State college, compared with last year, is indicated by the advance applications for admittance received by E. B. Lemon, registrar.

As freshman week starts September 18, Mr. Lemon is urging students to file their credentials immediately so as to avoid delay and possible disappointment in the last rush at registration time. This applies equally to all institutions, he says.

Students are going to be able to start this year with somewhat less cash in hand than at any time in many years as the result of reductions of fees and other expenses in effect this fall. It is estimated that with the cutting of fees by six dollars a term and with dormitory board and room at \$25 a month that it will cost a student at least \$100 less a year than could have been estimated a year ago.

Classification of those admitted to the college so far shows that the engineering school leads in total numbers in the coming freshman class. Next in order is home economics, lower division (junior college), secretarial science, education, agriculture, pharmacy and forestry. Those contemplating science as a major register first in lower division.

The tenth annual freshman week will be conducted much as in the past, with the program being arranged to afford the new students a thorough introduction to college life and its surroundings before actual class work begins.

TWO KILLED AS HOSIERY FACTORY STRIKERS RIOT

PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 1.—(AP)—Two men were shot and killed and at least 18 persons were injured today as 200 police battled many times their number of strikers and sympathizers outside the Cambria Hosiery mills, northeastern Philadelphia.

The dead men were Clem H. Norwood and Frank Milnor, strike pickets. The shooting occurred after the overturning of a truck bringing non-strikers to work. Police estimated the crowd to number 2,800, while other sources placed the total much higher. Police did not know who did the shooting. An officer riding in the cab of the truck said he fired two shots into the ground and two into the air, but that the death-dealing bullets were fired later. Witnesses said the later shots came from the truck after it rolled over.

Virtually every hosiery mill in Philadelphia has been closed by the walkout, and strikers from all parts of the city congregated at the Cambria plant. Fifty police already were on guard because of previous disorders in the eight-week strike, but they were overwhelmed when the trouble started.

Eight automobiles carrying strikers had broken through the picket lines, although every window was broken by missiles, when the truck appeared. In it were 14 employees. The crowd pushed the truck and bowed it over, trapping the workers inside. Then the pickets began battering at the vehicle and shots rang forth. Norwood was killed instantly and Milnor died soon afterward in a hospital.

BENEFIT OF PEARS IN DIET SHOWN IN COLLEGE BULLETIN

Any time Oregon pear growers decide to tell the world about the advantages of eating frequently a rich, ripe Boar, Anjou or Winter Nells, they will be able to get plenty of health arguments from a new Oregon State college experiment station bulletin entitled "Biochemical Investigations of Certain Winter Pears."

Behind this formidable sounding title, James C. Moore, assistant horticulturist of the station, reveals the results of research into just what winter pears are made of and what place they might be reasonably expected to fill in the diet.

The report he just makes shows that in the matter of alkalinity, winter pears rate ahead of some famous fruits widely advertised for this property. In what is termed "buffer value," used in measuring the probable effect of foods in certain conditions such as malnutrition, these pears show up exceptionally favorably. In copper content, considered somewhat related to prevention or treatment of anemia, winter pears are three to four times better than other fruits.

The research was carried on at the college in cooperation with the Northwest Pear bureau. Similar studies have shown these pears to be high in vitamin content and to contain large amounts of levulose sugar at some stages of development. Pear production is now the major fruit industry of the state.

ELKS PICNIC GROUNDS LOCKED ACCOUNT FIRE
