Visitan Miner in Town—Andrew Johnson, veteran miner of the Blue Ledge district, is spending a few days in the city.

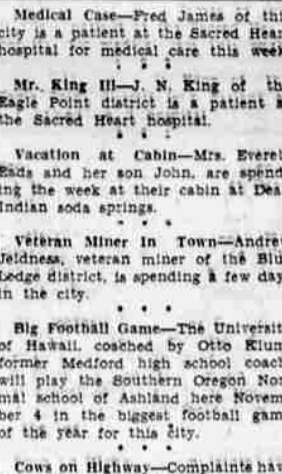
